Chair Hales welcomed the new provincially-appointed board members, Mr. Marc Gomes and Mr. Paul Sweet, and confirmed that they had each sworn the Oath of Office on May 14, 2019.

There was no pecuniary interest declared by a member of the Board.

4. Election of Vice Chair

Chair Christopher Hales called for nominations for Vice Chair of the Tecumseh Police Services Board for the remainder of 2019. Member Marc Gomes nominated Member Paul Sweet, seconded by Deputy Mayor Joe Bachetti. Following second and third calls for nominations, no further nominations were received. The Chair asked Mr. Sweet if he wishes to stand and Mr. Sweet accepted.

7. Delegations

8. OPP Monthly Report

Inspector Glenn Miller provided a summary of the OPP Report for the months of March and April 2019.

Following discussion of the high incidence of 911 misdials, a member inquired if any municipality has enacted a bylaw to enforce a penalty or cost recovery provisions for such calls. Inspector Miller responded that, due to the nature of the emergency 911 system, such a bylaw could not be enacted. There was additional discussion on measures taken to educate the public in the past.

A member inquired regarding firearms training for auxiliary officers. Inspector Miller explained that there are 42 auxiliary members for the Essex County Detachment, and they need to be trained to safely handle a weapon in case an officer became incapacitated. They do not, however, carry or use weapons in the course of their duties.

He thanked Members Paul Sweet and Marc Gomes for stepping in at short notice to assist with the board's conference report, which will be available for the next meeting.

12. Old Business

a. Community Safety and Well-Being Plan - CAO Update

CAO Marg Misek-Evans reported that the matter of the Town's Community Safety and Well-Being Plan has been raised with senior administration. She also intends to suggest a joint approach by Essex area municipalities in the production of this plan at the next Area CAO meeting, and will keep the board informed of next steps.

b. Bike Patrols – OPP Update

Staff Sgt. Jamie Smith reported that, due to the ongoing wet weather this spring, bike patrols have not started. The detachment is looking into the option of involving auxiliary members in this activity. Chair Hales requested that, when a formal plan for bike patrols has been formulated, it be forwarded to the board and Town Council as there is a high level of interest. Sgt. Smith also noted that motorcycle enforcement is available for some events, with one rider based in the Tecumseh detachment.

c. 2019 Joint Essex County Police Services Boards Meeting

Chair Hales noted that two agenda items were submitted by the board, namely Community Safety and Well-Being Planning and discussion on a local proposal for board amalgamation in response to legislative requirements. A date for the joint meeting, to be hosted by the Municipality of Leamington, has not yet been confirmed.

13. New Business

a. New Member Orientation

Chair Hales reported that the new members have been provided with the board's reference manual. He further noted that details on legislated training for new board members (and who will deliver the training) have not been finalized yet. The new members expressed an interest in participating in an OPP 'ride along' as well as a tour of the Essex County detachment headquarters; the Recording Secretary will follow up to arrange.

b. OPP Update on Grants and Programs

Sgt. Jamie Smith thanked the board for arranging a special meeting on short notice to approve the submission to the Ministry of the Solicitor General for the Community Safety and Policing (CSP) grant program.

Chair Hales noted that, next year with more lead time, it may be advantageous to consider funding for the Community Safety and Well-Being Planning process when submitting grant applications.

c. Other New Business

i. Parking Ticket Duties for Tecumseh OPP

Staff Sgt. Smith explained that Tecumseh is the only detachment in Essex County where the detachment administrative staff complete the processing of parking tickets, as opposed to municipal staff handling this function. He provided some historical background as to how this situation came about, and indicated the OPP would prefer the Town to take over the processing of parking tickets. CAO Margaret Misek-Evans will follow up on this matter.

ii. Optimist Club's Victoria Day Fireworks

Deputy Mayor Bachetti thanked the OPP for their effective and professional policing of the recent Victoria Day Fireworks event organized by the Optimist Club. He noted that the OPP, Optimist Club and Town Administration plan to hold a debrief meeting on incidents at the event and will be making recommendations for future events to prevent similar issues.

5. New Business

a. Essex County OPP Application for Community Safety and Policing (CSP) Grant

Staff Sgt. Jamie Smith provided regrets from Essex County OPP Inspector Glenn Miller, who was out of town due to policing business. He also thanked the board for convening in special session to meet the tight provincial timelines for this grant program.

PC Blake Cohoe, a member of the Essex County OPP's Mental Health Response Unit, introduced Stephanie Bula of Hotel Dieu Grace Healthcare, a social worker with the Unit. PC Cohoe explained that the Ministry of the Solicitor General has introduced a new grant program – the Community Safety and Policing (CSP) Grant – and that, in order for the Essex County OPP's application to be considered it must include signatures of all board members from all five Essex County municipalities included in the joint grant application.

PC Cohoe then outlined the two proposals included in the grant application. The first is for a Mobile Crisis Rapid Response Team (MCRRT) that would respond to calls for persons in a mental health/addiction crisis over the age of 16. The goals of this team would be to divert individuals from hospital emergency departments and the criminal justice system, and provide supports for early future intervention.

The second proposal is for a Youth Crisis Response Team (YCRT) that would respond to calls for youth in a mental health/addiction crisis under the age of 16. The goals are similar to the MCRRT but geared to youth and children.

PC Cohoe and Ms. Bula answered a number of general questions regarding the implementation of these programs, and explained that funding could be provided for only one of the proposals (the total for both programs applied for is \$389,000). The funds applied for would be used for dedicated officers throughout Essex County, community education and support to parents and community members.




















Notable Investigations

Lakeshore	Officers were dispatched to a commercial B&E in progress after motion sensors were set off and two males could be seen on video. Officers arrived and located a female known to them parked at the entrance of the property. She admitted to driving two males, also known to police, to the property. Officers contained the area, and with help of K9, successfully located both suspects who were charged with Break & Enter and Mischief, while one was additionally charged with Fail to Comply with Probation x3.
Lunconord	Officers responded to a 911 call reporting that the captain of a large sailboat had gone overboard without a lifejacket and could not be seen. The remaining occupants of the boat did not have any sailing experience. Officers responded immediately and secured personal watercraft to assist both the wayward sailboat and the missing boater. Officers gained control of the sailboat and the captain was located and removed from the water in good condition.
Tecumseh	A 31 year old male US resident was arrested and charges with numerous counts of Theft, Possession and Fraud after reports of a tall, thin white male attending gas/convenience stores and walking off with a large number of expensive scratch lottery tickets and cigarettes. The male redeemed winning tickets at other stores for cash. OPP officers identified the suspect from video evidence from a previous police interaction. This identification additionally assisted Windsor and LaSalle Police Services in closing their cases. In total, this male was believed responsible for at least 25 separate events with all three services.
Kingsville	An officer conducting radar stopped a vehicle for speeding. The officer observed a clear bag of marihuana at the driver's feet. The driver was removed from the vehicle to search for additional amounts accessible to the driver. During this search, a substance believed to be MDMA, was located inside a fanny pack on the backseat. The driver was subsequently arrested for Possession of a Schedule I substance. The driver was additional charged after various pills and suspected cocaine were located in the trunk.
	A large scale search warrant was executed by members of the O.P.P and York Regional Police for two industrial greenhouses growing marihuana without licence. Approximately 6,000 plants and \$25,000 in cash was seized and linked to other investigations in the province.
Leamington	Officers were alerted to a male who attended the hospital after being struck with a machete. Due to fear, the male initially provided vague and incorrect information. After an exhaustive investigation, officers learned that the victim was lured to a residence where he struck with a machete, threatened and robbed of more than \$600. A 30 year old male, known to the victim, was charged with Robbery, Uttering Threats, Forcible Confinement and Fail to Comply with Recognizance x3.
	Officers responded to reports of multiple collisions involving the same vehicle. After two of the vehicles ended up off the roadway, the male driver punched the vehicle of the other driver while yelling and threatening her. The male caller was subsequently charged with multiple counts of Assault, Assault with a Weapon and Mischief.

Notable Investigations

Lakeshore	A vehicle stop resulted in the female driver and her male passenger being arrested for Failing to Comply with their non-association order. A search, incident to arrest, resulted in the seizure of Schedule I substances and pepper spray (a prohibited device).

A 32 yr. old male was charged with Dangerous Operation cause Bodily Harm, Fail to Stop at Accident result in Bodily Harm, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime and multiple HTA offences.
	An officer on patrol located an injury-related accident involving two vehicles at an intersection in Harrow. A 22 yr. old male was found to have consumed alcohol in the City of Windsor and became lost trying to return home. He was arrested and charged with Impaired and Exceed Cause Bodily Harm after his passenger suffered serious, but non-life threatening injuries.

Ontario Association of Police Services Boards 2019 Spring Conference and Annual General Meeting

May 22-25, 2019 Caesars Windsor | Windsor, ON

"The Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act"

Conference Delegates

The Tecumseh Police Services Board was represented at this conference by Christopher Hales (Chair), Marc Gomes, Paul Sweet, Margaret Misek-Evans (CAO) and Ellen Preuschat.

Wednesday, May 22

Board Training - Strategic Planning

(Notes by C. Hales)

Fred Kaustinen, Executive Director of the Ontario Association of Police Services Boards (OAPSB), presented a workshop on Board Strategic Planning. The goal of the workshop was to create a typical governance model, starting with the basic definition of what exactly is the function of a Police Services Board (PSB).

The basis on which we discussed this was:

"A Police Services Board is to ensure that police activities and consequences are congruent with the community's needs, values and expectations."

Therefore we need to:

- Watch the police service's performance and results and see wisely and use comparators from all sources.
- Observe crime trends, complaints, and the media's view of our service.
- Hear the community stakeholders' needs and expectations, including the school boards,
 BIA, service associations, provincial and federal regulators.
- **Speak** of the board's vision, values and expected outcomes.
- Liaise with the entire community.

Resulting actions would include the board setting the strategy with the Detachment Commander (DC) around a central theme of service that would drive all the performance and activity of the service.

Thursday, May 23

Opening Ceremony

The conference was formally opened by Phil Huck, Chairman of the OAPSB. He encouraged everyone attending to load the conference app and take advantage of the information contained therein. Mayor Drew Dilkens offered greetings from the City of Windsor.

First Nations Community Safety

Professor Andy Graham, Queen's University
Fabian Batise, Board Liaison, Nishnawbe Aski Police Service
(Notes by E. Preuschat)

This was an in-depth overview of the context, history, changes and challenges related to policing First Nations communities in Ontario. The new *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA) marks a turning point in this regard, as First Nation police services boards will become legally constituted bodies subject to provincial legislation. They will have the same powers and duties as municipal boards, and be subject to the same adequacy standards. This is a first in Ontario history.

Professor Graham's presentation covered:

- basic facts on Ontario's first nations communities (for example, more than 50 different languages are spoken)
- an overview of pre-colonial peacekeeping and aboriginal customary law ("memories of the Elders")
- a summary of the first treaty system and how the treaty-based policing relationship was broken by two things the residential school genocide and apartheid-like pass system
- an overview of past funding models, and
- provincial variations in First Nations policing, some success stories, and core problems with the current policy framework

Mr. Batise's presentation covered:

- current legislated standards for municipal boards compared to the inadequacy of the status quo for First Nations communities (with numerous examples of constables working without radios or backup, in sub-standard buildings, etc.)
- features of the new CSPA that will ensure "a police officer is a police officer" regardless
 of whether serving municipal, OPP or First Nations communities same standards will
 apply
- funding remedies for First Nations boards and communities, and
- what makes up culturally competent oversight

Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police

Chief Bryan Larkin, Waterloo Police Services Board

(Notes by E. Preuschat)

Chief Larkin outlined some of the major initiatives and concerns of the OACP:

- The association just completed its five year strategy document.
- Watch for significant changes in labour relations with the new policing legislation.
- Who will pay for third party adjudication as outlined in the new Comprehensive Ontario Police Services (COPS) Act?
- Community Safety and Well-Being Plans are a good initiative...but again, who will pay?

- Regulations associated with the new COPS Act are in process. OAPSB and all stakeholders should be at the table while these are being developed.
- Ontario has reduced the budget for policing. A different funding model needs to be considered.
- The police recruitment/selection process is outdated; it needs to better reflect the communities served.
- Digital evidence management is a significant step in modernizing in the justice system, but who will pay?
- The working committees of the OACP currently have four major areas of focus:
 - 1. The opioid crisis in Ontario; deaths are occurring at unprecedented levels
 - 2. Community Safety and Well-Being Planning
 - 3. Constable selection process
 - 4. Wellness programs
 - Some federal funds are available for PTSD, but with few details at this time.
 - The OACP is advocating for a working group to develop a provincial strategy to support wellness.

CALM: A Proven Four-Step Process to Transform Stress Into Action Denise Marek, International Speaker/Author/Worry Management Expert (Notes by E. Preuschat)

In her motivational and humorous presentation, Denise Marek emphasized the need to challenge our assumptions, as they often cause unnecessary stress and anxiety. She outlined the "CALM" approach to transforming worry and stress into positive action:

C – Challenge your Assumptions

• try to get facts and move beyond perceptions and assumptions. Strategies for doing this are (1) talk to someone else for a second opinion, and (2) ask yourself, "is it probable?"

A – Act to Control the Uncontrollable

• Counter the fear of looking foolish by caring more what you think of yourself (act with integrity to grow your self-respect). Counter fear of making mistakes by aiming for progress, not perfection.

L – Let Go of the Uncontrollable

M – Master Your Mind

• Strategies include: (1) focus on what you CAN do, and (2) challenge limiting beliefs by differentiating between facts and opinions.

The Community Safety & Policing Act 2019 – Ministry of the Solicitor General

Fuad Abdi, Manager, Policing Standards Section Cecilla Omole, Team Lead, Policing Standards Section

(Notes by C. Hales & M. Misek-Evans)

Fuad Abidi, and Cecilia Omole, Policing Standards, Ministry of the Solicitor General conducted a general review of some of the provisions of the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* focusing on its core principles of diversity, inclusiveness as guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and the Human Rights Code.

Fuad and Cecilia shared that there will be many Regulations to this Act, not written yet. Consultation is yet to start, and once that is gathered from stakeholders and incorporated into the Regulations the government will have a 45 day posting and comments period before final enactment. The Ministry admits that there is no timeline as yet.

A summary of legislative changes includes:

- Enforcement of municipal by-laws and court security are <u>not</u> part of the policy service under the new Act.
- The new Act provides for some police services to be out-sourced.
- New Act requires one OPP detachment board per OPP detachment with requirements for community representation and input; the regulations may allow for more than one board in certain circumstances.
 - Board composition, terms, remuneration are all to be determined in the regulations but unlikely to be limited to the current 5 members;
 - Boards will be required to prepare estimates for the Board's operations and submit to every municipality that gets policing services from the detachment;
 - The Board will also help choose the Detachment Commander (DC).
- Detachment Boards may set local policies after consultation with the DC.
 - Local policies must not conflict with the strategic priorities of the Solicitor General, must not relate to specific investigations and cannot force the OPP to do what they cannot do or not to do what they are required to as components of adequate and effective policing.
- The DC must develop a local action plan, with consultation.
- Board training is required and must be 'successful'.
 - Training on roles and responsibilities;
 - Recognition and respect for diverse populations;
 - Training on human rights and systemic racism.
- New Inspector General (IG) position created to:
 - o Conduct investigation to ensure no act of misconduct by members of the Boards;
 - Impose a remedy for misconduct and/or non-compliance with the Act or Regulations.
- The OIPRD will be replaced with the "Law Enforcement Complaints Agency" (LECA), an independent agency that reports to the Solicitor General.
 - LECA deals with all public complaints for police and special officers of the Legislative Assembly and Niagara Parks Commission.
 - LECA refers complaints regarding the conduct of PSB members to the IG.
 - o LECA may refer investigations to others like the DC or Police Chief.

- The requirement for a Community Safety & Well Being Plan comes into effect immediately with CSWB Plans due by January 1, 2021.
- The Special Investigations Unit Act is a new stand-alone statute overseen by the Attorney General that governs policy oversight.

A question and answer period followed where it became clear that many of the Section 10 boards that were being asked to amalgamate had real issues with the process, representation and the practicality of the concept.

Friday, May 24

Police Boards and the Media
Wendy Gillis, Crime Reporter, The Star
(Notes by C. Hales)

Wendy Gillis, a crime reporter for the Toronto Star was available by Skype to the conference audience. She provided her observations of the shortcomings of the interaction of PSB's with the media. Her thoughts included:

- Need to make the PSB mandate, role and function relevant to the citizenry.
- Need to make sure the public has access to police board meetings through welcoming, neutral locations and convenient timing.
- We should consider live streaming our PSB meetings.
- Boards would do well to raise the public's awareness of their work.
- All communications should be vetted to ensure that they are open, accountable and transparent. These communications need to be "real" and ring as authentic with the media.
- Be mindful of the lessons from Thunder Bay PSB, Peterborough PSB and the real accountability that can fall on a board found not performing as expected.
- Boards must engage in detailed training to be effective in applying the new Act. Media training is also very important, especially for larger boards.
- Wendy ended with a review of the Senator Sinclair report on the systemic racism of the Thunder Bay Police Service and the willful "blind eye" of the PSB.

Police Boards & Police Associations

Bruce Chapman, President, Police Association of Ontario

(Notes by C. Hales & M. Misek-Evans)

Bruce Chapman, President of the Association of Ontario presented the views of the Association on the future of policing in Ontario. He represents 48 associations with a total of about 14,000 members. Essentially, Mr. Chapman presented his view of what municipalities need to do in bargaining future contracts. His view is that in the light of rising costs and new labour demands and reduced funding, it will be the board's duty to find cost savings.

Mr. Chapman recommended that PSBs influence local issues of relevance to policing and commented that strong boards are independent and effective. On the other hand, he indicated that weak boards are beholden to political players such as municipal Councils and Chiefs of Police. It is important to police personnel that the Board is getting along well with each other and the service. Mr. Chapman further recommended that PSBs do a better job of sharing information between each other and undertake training on what police officers actually do. He advocated for evidence-based policing that is data driven. He was favourable of the new training requirements set out in the Act however, he was not favourable to the provisions that allowed for outsourcing of some services.

Sexual Assault Investigation Reviews

Vanessa Ambtman-Smith, London Police Services Board

(Notes by P. Sweet)

Background

- Presenter was an Indigenous rights advocate of Métis heritage
- Stated that there was tension with the Chief & Deputy Chief
- Results from "unfounded" police sexual assault review
- London was used as a case study as what not to do in sexual assault investigations
- High urban indigenous population (did not provide statistics)

The London Police Services Board recognized there was an opportunity to assume a leadership role as a public oversight body responsible for articulating and governing adequate and effective policing.

Process

- Anonymous email input from community was accepted
- Used existing community resources in the vulnerable community
- Support from police service was thought to be lacking

Results

- After many rewrites, a new Board Policy relating to Sexual Assault Investigation was adopted
 - Board Policy that attempted to direct investigation "procedures" would have been in conflict with the PSA
- Copies of the new Policy are available on the London Police Services Board website
- Presentation was academic and high-level

Community Safety and Well-Being Planning

Rob Burton, Chair, Halton Police Services Board Deputy Chief Nishan Duraiappah, Halton Police Services Alex Sarchuk, Commissioner of Social and Community Services (Notes by P. Sweet)

Indicated from the start that they were there to lower our expectations of fear and doubt regarding plan preparation.

Mayor Burton

- Halton rural and urban area pop 590,000
- High level of community satisfaction
- Safe community but has troubles
- Plan works on root causes and responses
- Their plan 24 pages (we have copy)
- There is Ministry template (we have copy)
- Started from the top rather than at the bottom
- Advised, "do not reinvent the wheel"

Deputy Chief

- This is coordinating existing resources
- Principle is multi sector collaboration to reduce risk not small risk, community elevated risk
- Apply system most effectively to those who need it the most.
- Police Services Act requires municipality(s) to adopt plan by Jan 2021
- Responsibility rests with municipality(s)
- Requires multi-sector advisory committee for identification of risk factors.

Halton Plan

- Situation table launched in 2013
- Multi –sectors addressing situation
- 500+ situations addressed to date, 98 in 2018
- Began process of issue / risk identification
- Launched and had all stakeholders there
- Living document
- Emphasis on leveraging existing assets
- Establish a "response ready" infrastructure to facilitate multi sector collaboration.
- Model based on:
 - evidence based issue identification
 - situation table
 - system leadership group
 - o (Senior table) Executive Leadership

Action Tables

- People, programs & services best positioned to respond
- Focused on system level issues that require a collaborative or multi sector response
- Issues assessed against criteria

Halton Actions

- Improving access to mental health supports for children and youth
- Implementing a more coordinated approach to address homelessness
- Enhance response to sexual assault
- Supporting youth exiting care of the child welfare system.
- Reducing alcohol consumption and associated health and social impacts
- Addressing older adult isolation through proactive approaches
- Establishing a Halton approach to mental heath and addictions planning
- Exploring a Halton framework to support those who are dually diagnosed

Pat Weaver was elected as our Zone 6 representative.

Remarks by Solicitor General

Honourable Sylvia Jones, Solicitor General

(Notes by C. Hales)

Ms. Jones stated that as a result of current deficits, we pay \$1.5M per day in interest charges. The control and reduction of the current debt is the cornerstone of government policy and programs. The current focus is the protection of Health Care, Security and Education. The government will support policing with policy changes such as the use of Naloxone in the treatment of opioid overdose. Her speech was very short but very focused on current government policy.

Wounded Warriors

Phil Ralph, National Program Director, Wounded Warriors Canada

Conference delegates were introduced to the work of this organization which aims to support Canada's ill and injured Canadian Armed Forces members, Veterans, First Responders and their families through innovative mental health programs.

Gardaworld

Colleen Arnold, National VP, Customer Service Excellence & Operations Central Canada

Major sponsor Gardaworld introduced the ways in which this security firm is working in partnership with police forces, and potential new opportunities for support services.

Cannabis Update: Outdoor Grow, an Industry Disrupter

Moderator: Jeanine Lassaline-Berglund

Speakers: WeedMD, 48North Cannabis Corp

(Notes by M. Gomes)

A recap of industry significant events since last year's conference began the session, including the municipal and provincial elections, new police legislation and new *Cannabis Act*.

The Cannabis Act has the following objectives:

- restrict youth access to cannabis
- protect young people from promotion or enticements to use cannabis
- reduce criminal activity by imposing serious criminal penalties for those who break the law
- protect public health through strict product safety and quality requirements
- reduce the burden on the criminal justice system (e.g. decreasing arrests)
- allow adults to possess and access regulated, quality-controlled legal cannabis
- enhance public awareness of the health risks associated with cannabis

Health Canada's Role

The federal framework for operators is to provide security requirements (avoid diversion to illicit markets), educate the public at large and to set rules on the production and quality of the product.

Provincial Control Role

The role of the province is to regulate how cannabis will reach the consumers. Set up the packaging and label standards. A main concern in the packaging would be make it both child resistant and tamper-evident.

Municipal Level

Determine where cannabis can be consumed within the municipality. Licensing of the retail outlets within the communities, and decision if the municipality wants to have stores in their communities. If the municipality decided to have distributors (stores) there are bylaws and property standards to be adhered to.

Outdoor Growers

The legal producers will have to incur set regulatory fees, excise tax and cost recovery. To produce the product they must compete with the "black market." Their costs in production will be monitored.

The current supply shortage has created the need to have outdoor grow operations. The outdoor grow industry is going to be the wave of the future to keep up with demand. There are presently three farms licensed to grow cannabis outdoors in Ontario.

Product grown outdoors costs .25/ gm compared to \$1 to \$3 / gm cost indoors. The regulations are very strict, where all grams are recorded, safe product must be cultivated, and property secured where the product is grown (24 hour security, video surveillance etc.). There are random inspections of staff and strict rules to secure the area just like indoor operations.

The expectation is that outdoor grows will create more jobs in the future.

The targeted age group is above 25 years and more women will consume the product. The intention of cannabis is not for the "high" but for skin care, pain management and medical needs.

Some concerns were brought forward from the audience in regards to the scent that it creates. It was mentioned that it is a plant that has a scent just like any other plant or even compared to agricultural smells (chicken, pig farms, etc.). The outdoor grow will have only one cycle of crop growth per year compared to continuous indoor production.

The final take away was that there must be community support for outdoor producers. The education and awareness component is very important.

OAPSB Annual General Meeting

(Notes by C. Hales)

The OAPSB Annual General Meeting was held with only one item of business that, after debate, was passed. It altered board members' aggregate years of service to 12 years. The newly elected board was introduced.

Saturday, May 25

The Future of Police Board Training
Fred Kaustinen, Executive Director, OAPSB
(Notes by E. Preuschat)

The objective of this interactive session was to build consensus on a common vision regarding future board training. The current training model is seen as outdated and somewhat simplistic.

At the conference, delegates completed a survey on training needs, and Fred Kaustinen, OAPSB Executive Director, presented the survey results. The consensus on governance style was that the majority govern by 'receiving reports' and most would like to spend more time doing strategic planning and community engagement. The top choices for training needs were: strategic planning, policy development, performance evaluations, external communications and meeting procedures.

Fred presented the draft 'job description' of police services boards:

 "To ensure that police actions and consequences are congruent with the community's needs, values and expectations"

He then reviewed the tasks for the board (see/hear/speak – see notes in Strategic Planning Training section) along with the 6 main governance responsibilities:

- 1. strategic planning
- 2. establish policies for policing the community
- 3. hire top cop

- 4. evaluate chief's performance
- 5. establish HR policy framework
- 6. establish the budget

A lengthy and engaged group discussion followed on the whether the above captures the essence of police governance (generally agreed that it does), what training is required to fulfill these obligations, and what the members would like to see from the OAPSB with regard to education and board training.

Many points were raised during this group discussion, including:

- training should be customized to type of board (municipal vs OPP, large vs small)
- training should leverage existing technology to overcome geographical barriers
- guidelines on public engagement are needed questions to ask, pitfalls to avoid
- a proper orientation program for new members is needed
- who will pay for training development? for delivery? for participation?
- there should be additional training for board chairs, including media and communications
- conferences are ideal for classroom type training
- OAPSB should become "a centre of excellence" for ongoing board education and training

ONTARIO TRANSFER PAYMENT AGREEMENT

THE AGREEMENT is effective as of the 1st day of April, 2019

BETWEEN:

Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario as represented by the Solicitor General

(the "Province")

- and -

Town of Tecumseh Police Services Board

(the "Recipient")

BACKGROUND

- A. The Recipient carries out a program of traffic stop sobriety checks in its jurisdiction as part of a program to "Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere" ("R.I.D.E.");
- B. The Province has established the R.I.D.E. Grant program to provide Funds to assist various police services in offsetting their costs for implementing R.I.D.E. programs of sobriety checks in their jurisdictions;
- C. The Recipient is a municipal police services board or a municipality in a municipality that has established a municipal police service or whose council has entered into an agreement under s. 10 of the *Police Services Act* for the provision of police services by the OPP; or it is a First Nation police services board or a First Nation band council in a First Nation community that has established a First Nation police service pursuant to a policing services agreement between Canada, the Province, the Recipient and the Board;
- D. The Recipient has, by written application, requested funding for overtime and/or paid duty in pursuance of the R.I.D.E. Grant Project, a description of which is outlined in Schedule "C"; and
- E. The application for Funds submitted by the Recipient has been accepted, in whole or in part, by the Province.

CONSIDERATION

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained in this Agreement and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are expressly acknowledged, the Province and the Recipient agree as follows:

1.0 ENTIRE AGREEMENT

1.1 The agreement, together with:

Schedule "A" - General Terms and Conditions

Schedule "B" - Project Specific Information and Additional Provisions

Schedule "C" - Project

Schedule "D" - Budget, Payment Plan and Reporting

Schedule "E" - Reports – Final Report Templates, and

any amending agreement entered into as provided for in section 3.1, constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter contained in the Agreement and supersedes all prior oral or written representations and agreements.

2.0 CONFLICT OR INCONSISTENCY

- 2.1 **Conflict or Inconsistency.** In the event of a conflict or inconsistency between the Additional Provisions and the provisions in Schedule "A", the following rules will apply:
 - (a) the Parties will interpret any Additional Provisions in so far as possible, in a way that preserves the intention of the Parties as expressed in Schedule "A": and
 - (b) where it is not possible to interpret the Additional Provisions in a way that is consistent with the provisions in Schedule "A", the Additional Provisions will prevail over the provisions in Schedule "A" to the extent of the inconsistency.

3.0 AMENDING THE AGREEMENT

3.1 The Agreement may only be amended by a written agreement duly executed by the Parties.

4.0 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

- 4.1 The Recipient acknowledges that:
 - (a) by receiving Funds it may become subject to legislation applicable to organizations that receive funding from the Government of Ontario, including the *Broader Public Sector Accountability Act, 2010* (Ontario), the *Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act, 1996* (Ontario), and the *Auditor*

General Act (Ontario);

- (b) Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario has issued expenses, perquisites, and procurement directives and guidelines pursuant to the *Broader Public Sector Accountability Act, 2010* (Ontario);
- (c) the Funds are:
 - (i) to assist the Recipient to carry out the Project and not to provide goods or services to the Province;
 - (ii) funding for the purposes of the *Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act, 1996* (Ontario);
- (d) the Province is not responsible for carrying out the Project; and
- (e) the Province is bound by the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (Ontario) and that any information provided to the Province in connection with the Project or otherwise in connection with the Agreement may be subject to disclosure in accordance with that Act.

SCHEDULE "A" GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

A1.0 INTERPRETATION AND DEFINITIONS

- A1.1 **Interpretation.** For the purposes of interpretation:
 - (a) words in the singular include the plural and vice-versa;
 - (b) words in one gender include all genders;
 - (c) the headings do not form part of the Agreement; they are for reference only and will not affect the interpretation of the Agreement;
 - (d) any reference to dollars or currency will be in Canadian dollars and currency; and
 - (e) "include", "includes" and "including" denote that the subsequent list is not exhaustive.
- A1.2 **Definitions.** In the Agreement, the following terms will have the following meanings:
 - "Additional Provisions" means the terms and conditions set out in Schedule "B".
 - "Agreement" means this agreement entered into between the Province and the Recipient, all of the schedules listed in section 1.1, and any amending agreement entered into pursuant to section 3.1.
 - "Budget" means the budget attached to the Agreement as Schedule "D".
 - "Business Day" means any working day, Monday to Friday inclusive, excluding statutory and other holidays, namely: New Year's Day; Family Day; Good Friday; Easter Monday; Victoria Day; Canada Day; Civic Holiday; Labour Day; Thanksgiving Day; Remembrance Day; Christmas Day; Boxing Day and any other day on which the Province has elected to be closed for business.
 - "Effective Date" means the date set out at the top of the Agreement.
 - "Event of Default" has the meaning ascribed to it in section A13.1.
 - "Expiry Date" means the expiry date set out in Schedule "B".
 - "Funding Year" means:
 - (a) in the case of the first Funding Year, the period commencing on the Effective Date and ending on the following March 31; and

(b) in the case of Funding Years subsequent to the first Funding Year, the period commencing on April 1 following the end of the previous Funding Year and ending on the following March 31.

"Funds" means the money the Province provides to the Recipient pursuant to the Agreement.

"Indemnified Parties" means Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario, Her ministers, agents, appointees, and employees.

"Maximum Funds" means the maximum Funds set out in Schedule "B".

"Notice" means any communication given or required to be given pursuant to the Agreement.

"Notice Period" means the period of time within which the Recipient is required to remedy an Event of Default pursuant to section A13.3(b), and includes any such period or periods of time by which the Province extends that time in accordance with section A13.4.

"Parties" means the Province and the Recipient.

"Party" means either the Province or the Recipient.

"Project" means the undertaking described in Schedule "C".

"Reports" means the reports described in Schedule "F".

A2.0 REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES, AND COVENANTS

- A2.1 **General.** The Recipient represents, warrants, and covenants that:
 - (a) it is, and will continue to be, a validly existing legal entity with full power to fulfill its obligations under the Agreement;
 - (b) it has, and will continue to have, the experience and expertise necessary to carry out the Project;
 - (c) it is in compliance with, and will continue to comply with, all federal and provincial laws and regulations, all municipal by-laws, and any other orders, rules, and by-laws related to any aspect of the Project, the Funds, or both; and
 - (d) unless otherwise provided for in the Agreement, any information the Recipient provided to the Province in support of its request for funds (including information relating to any eligibility requirements) was true and complete at the time the Recipient provided it and will continue to be

true and complete.

- A2.2 **Execution of Agreement.** The Recipient represents and warrants that it has:
 - (a) the full power and authority to enter into the Agreement; and
 - (b) taken all necessary actions to authorize the execution of the Agreement.
- A2.3 **Governance.** The Recipient represents, warrants, and covenants that it has, will maintain in writing, and will follow:
 - (a) a code of conduct and ethical responsibilities for all persons at all levels of the Recipient's organization;
 - (b) procedures to enable the Recipient's ongoing effective functioning;
 - (c) decision-making mechanisms for the Recipient;
 - (d) procedures to enable the Recipient to manage Funds prudently and effectively;
 - (e) procedures to enable the Recipient to complete the Project successfully;
 - (f) procedures to enable the Recipient to identify risks to the completion of the Project and strategies to address the identified risks, all in a timely manner;
 - (g) procedures to enable the preparation and submission of all Reports required pursuant to Article A7.0; and
 - (h) procedures to enable the Recipient to address such other matters as the Recipient considers necessary to enable the Recipient to carry out its obligations under the Agreement.
- A2.4 **Supporting Proof.** Upon the request of the Province, the Recipient will provide the Province with proof of the matters referred to in Article A2.0.

A3.0 TERM OF THE AGREEMENT

A3.1 **Term.** The term of the Agreement will commence on the Effective Date and will expire on the Expiry Date unless terminated earlier pursuant to Article A11.0, Article A12.0, or Article A13.0.

A4.0 FUNDS AND CARRYING OUT THE PROJECT

- A4.1 **Funds Provided.** The Province will:
 - (a) provide the Recipient up to the Maximum Funds for the purpose of

- carrying out the Project;
- (b) provide the Funds to the Recipient in accordance with the payment plan attached to the Agreement as Schedule "E"; and
- (c) deposit the Funds into an account designated by the Recipient provided that the account:
 - (i) resides at a Canadian financial institution; and
 - (ii) is in the name of the Recipient.

A4.2 **Limitation on Payment of Funds.** Despite section A4.1:

- (a) the Province is not obligated to provide any Funds to the Recipient until the Recipient provides the certificates of insurance or other proof as the Province may request pursuant to section A10.2;
- (b) the Province is not obligated to provide instalments of Funds until it is satisfied with the progress of the Project;
- (c) the Province may adjust the amount of Funds it provides to the Recipient in any Funding Year based upon the Province's assessment of the information the Recipient provides to the Province pursuant to section A7.1; or
- (d) if, pursuant to the *Financial Administration Act* (Ontario), the Province does not receive the necessary appropriation from the Ontario Legislature for payment under the Agreement, the Province is not obligated to make any such payment, and, as a consequence, the Province may:
 - (i) reduce the amount of Funds and, in consultation with the Recipient, change the Project; or
 - (ii) terminate the Agreement pursuant to section A12.1.

A4.3 **Use of Funds and Carry Out the Project.** The Recipient will do all of the following:

- (a) carry out the Project in accordance with the Agreement;
- (b) use the Funds only for the purpose of carrying out the Project;
- (c) spend the Funds only in accordance with the Budget; and
- (d) not use the Funds to cover any cost that has or will be funded or reimbursed by one or more of any third party, ministry, agency, or organization of the Government of Ontario.

- A4.4 **Interest Bearing Account.** If the Province provides Funds before the Recipient's immediate need for the Funds, the Recipient will place the Funds in an interest bearing account in the name of the Recipient at a Canadian financial institution.
- A4.5 **Interest.** If the Recipient earns any interest on the Funds, the Province may:
 - (a) deduct an amount equal to the interest from any further instalments of Funds; or
 - (b) demand from the Recipient the payment of an amount equal to the interest.
- A4.6 **Rebates, Credits, and Refunds.** The Ministry will calculate Funds based on the actual costs to the Recipient to carry out the Project, less any costs (including taxes) for which the Recipient has received, will receive, or is eligible to receive, a rebate, credit, or refund.

A5.0 RECIPIENT'S ACQUISITION OF GOODS OR SERVICES, AND DISPOSAL OF ASSETS

- A5.1 **Acquisition.** If the Recipient acquires goods, services, or both with the Funds, it will:
 - (a) do so through a process that promotes the best value for money; and
 - (b) comply with the *Broader Public Sector Accountability Act, 2010* (Ontario), including any procurement directive issued thereunder, to the extent applicable.
- A5.2 **Disposal.** The Recipient will not, without the Province's prior written consent, sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of any asset purchased or created with the Funds or for which Funds were provided, the cost of which exceeded the amount as provided for in Schedule "B" at the time of purchase.

A6.0 CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- A6.1 **No Conflict of Interest.** The Recipient will carry out the Project and use the Funds without an actual, potential, or perceived conflict of interest.
- A6.2 **Conflict of Interest Includes.** For the purposes of Article A6.0, a conflict of interest includes any circumstances where:
 - (a) the Recipient; or
 - (b) any person who has the capacity to influence the Recipient's decisions,

has outside commitments, relationships, or financial interests that could, or could be seen to, interfere with the Recipient's objective, unbiased, and impartial judgment relating to the Project, the use of the Funds, or both.

A6.3 **Disclosure to Province.** The Recipient will:

- disclose to the Province, without delay, any situation that a reasonable person would interpret as an actual, potential, or perceived conflict of interest; and
- (b) comply with any terms and conditions that the Province may prescribe as a result of the disclosure.

A7.0 REPORTS, ACCOUNTING, AND REVIEW

A7.1 **Preparation and Submission.** The Recipient will:

- (a) submit to the Province at the address referred to in section A17.1, all Reports in accordance with the timelines and content requirements as provided for in Schedule "F", or in a form as specified by the Province from time to time:
- (b) submit to the Province at the address referred to in section A17.1, any other reports as may be requested by the Province in accordance with the timelines and content requirements specified by the Province;
- (c) ensure that all Reports and other reports are completed to the satisfaction of the Province; and
- (d) ensure that all Reports and other reports are signed on behalf of the Recipient by an authorized signing officer.

A7.2 **Record Maintenance.** The Recipient will keep and maintain:

- (a) all financial records (including invoices) relating to the Funds or otherwise to the Project in a manner consistent with generally accepted accounting principles; and
- (b) all non-financial documents and records relating to the Funds or otherwise to the Project.
- A7.3 **Inspection.** The Province, any authorized representative, or any independent auditor identified by the Province may, at the Province's expense, upon twenty-four hours' Notice to the Recipient and during normal business hours, enter upon the Recipient's premises to review the progress of the Project and the Recipient's allocation and expenditure of the Funds and, for these purposes, the Province, any authorized representative, or any independent auditor identified by the Province may take one or more of the following actions:

- (a) inspect and copy the records and documents referred to in section A7.2;
- (b) remove any copies made pursuant to section A7.3(a) from the Recipient's premises; and
- (c) conduct an audit or investigation of the Recipient in respect of the expenditure of the Funds, the Project, or both.
- A7.4 **Disclosure.** To assist in respect of the rights provided for in section A7.3, the Recipient will disclose any information requested by the Province, any authorized representatives, or any independent auditor identified by the Province, and will do so in the form requested by the Province, any authorized representative, or any independent auditor identified by the Province, as the case may be.
- A7.5 **No Control of Records.** No provision of the Agreement will be construed so as to give the Province any control whatsoever over the Recipient's records.
- A7.6 **Auditor General.** The Province's rights under Article A7.0 are in addition to any rights provided to the Auditor General pursuant to section 9.1 of the *Auditor General Act* (Ontario).

A8.0 COMMUNICATIONS REQUIREMENTS

- A8.1 **Acknowledge Support.** Unless otherwise directed by the Province, the Recipient will:
 - (a) acknowledge the support of the Province for the Project; and
 - (b) ensure that the acknowledgement referred to in section A8.1(a) is in a form and manner as directed by the Province.
- A8.2 **Publication.** The Recipient will indicate, in any of its Project-related publications, whether written, oral, or visual, that the views expressed in the publication are the views of the Recipient and do not necessarily reflect those of the Province.

A9.0 INDEMNITY

A9.1 **Indemnification.** The Recipient will indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnified Parties from and against any and all liability, loss, costs, damages, and expenses (including legal, expert and consultant fees), causes of action, actions, claims, demands, lawsuits, or other proceedings, by whomever made, sustained, incurred, brought, or prosecuted, in any way arising out of or in connection with the Project or otherwise in connection with the Agreement, unless solely caused by the negligence or wilful misconduct of the Indemnified Parties.

A10.0 INSURANCE

- A10.1 Recipient's Insurance. The Recipient represents, warrants, and covenants that it has, and will maintain, at its own cost and expense, with insurers having a secure A.M. Best rating of B+ or greater, or the equivalent, all the necessary and appropriate insurance that a prudent person carrying out a project similar to the Project would maintain, including commercial general liability insurance on an occurrence basis for third party bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage, to an inclusive limit of not less than the amount provided for in Schedule "B" per occurrence. The insurance policy will include the following:
 - (a) the Indemnified Parties as additional insureds with respect to liability arising in the course of performance of the Recipient's obligations under, or otherwise in connection with, the Agreement;
 - (b) a cross-liability clause;
 - (c) contractual liability coverage; and
 - (d) a 30-day written notice of cancellation.

A10.2 **Proof of Insurance.** The Recipient will:

- (a) provide to the Province, either:
 - (i) certificates of insurance that confirm the insurance coverage as provided for in section A10.1; or
 - (ii) other proof that confirms the insurance coverage as provided for in section A10.1; and
- (b) upon the request of the Province, provide to the Province a copy of any insurance policy.

A11.0 TERMINATION ON NOTICE

- A11.1 **Termination on Notice.** The Province may terminate the Agreement at any time without liability, penalty, or costs upon giving at least 30 days' Notice to the Recipient.
- A11.2 Consequences of Termination on Notice by the Province. If the Province terminates the Agreement pursuant to section A11.1, the Province may take one or more of the following actions:
 - (a) cancel further instalments of Funds;
 - (b) demand from the Recipient the payment of any Funds remaining in the

- possession or under the control of the Recipient; and
- (c) determine the reasonable costs for the Recipient to wind down the Project, and do either or both of the following:
 - (i) permit the Recipient to offset such costs against the amount the Recipient owes pursuant to section A11.2(b); and
 - (ii) subject to section A4.1(a), provide Funds to the Recipient to cover such costs.

A12.0 TERMINATION WHERE NO APPROPRIATION

- A12.1 **Termination Where No Appropriation.** If, as provided for in section A4.2(d), the Province does not receive the necessary appropriation from the Ontario Legislature for any payment the Province is to make pursuant to the Agreement, the Province may terminate the Agreement immediately without liability, penalty, or costs by giving Notice to the Recipient.
- A12.2 **Consequences of Termination Where No Appropriation.** If the Province terminates the Agreement pursuant to section A12.1, the Province may take one or more of the following actions:
 - (a) cancel further instalments of Funds;
 - (b) demand from the Recipient the payment of any Funds remaining in the possession or under the control of the Recipient; and
 - (c) determine the reasonable costs for the Recipient to wind down the Project and permit the Recipient to offset such costs against the amount owing pursuant to section A12.2(b).
- A12.3 **No Additional Funds.** If, pursuant to section A12.2(c), the Province determines that the costs to wind down the Project exceed the Funds remaining in the possession or under the control of the Recipient, the Province will not provide additional Funds to the Recipient.

A13.0 EVENT OF DEFAULT, CORRECTIVE ACTION, AND TERMINATION FOR DEFAULT

- A13.1 **Events of Default.** Each of the following events will constitute an Event of Default:
 - (a) in the opinion of the Province, the Recipient breaches any representation, warranty, covenant, or other material term of the Agreement, including failing to do any of the following in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Agreement:
 - (i) carry out the Project;

- (ii) use or spend Funds; or
- (iii) provide, in accordance with section A7.1, Reports or such other reports as may have been requested pursuant to section A7.1(b);
- (b) the Recipient's operations, its financial condition, or its organizational structure, changes such that it no longer meets one or more of the eligibility requirements of the program under which the Province provides the Funds;
- (c) the Recipient makes an assignment, proposal, compromise, or arrangement for the benefit of creditors, or a creditor makes an application for an order adjudging the Recipient bankrupt, or applies for the appointment of a receiver; or
- (d) the Recipient ceases to operate.
- A13.2 Consequences of Events of Default and Corrective Action. If an Event of Default occurs, the Province may, at any time, take one or more of the following actions:
 - (a) initiate any action the Province considers necessary in order to facilitate the successful continuation or completion of the Project;
 - (b) provide the Recipient with an opportunity to remedy the Event of Default;
 - (c) suspend the payment of Funds for such period as the Province determines appropriate;
 - (d) reduce the amount of the Funds;
 - (e) cancel further instalments of Funds;
 - (f) demand from the Recipient the payment of any Funds remaining in the possession or under the control of the Recipient;
 - (g) demand from the Recipient the payment of an amount equal to any Funds the Recipient used, but did not use in accordance with the Agreement;
 - (h) demand from the Recipient the payment of an amount equal to any Funds the Province provided to the Recipient; and
 - (i) terminate the Agreement at any time, including immediately, without liability, penalty or costs to the Province upon giving Notice to the Recipient.

- A13.3 **Opportunity to Remedy.** If, in accordance with section A13.2(b), the Province provides the Recipient with an opportunity to remedy the Event of Default, the Province will give Notice to the Recipient of:
 - (a) the particulars of the Event of Default; and
 - (b) the Notice Period.
- A13.4 **Recipient not Remedying.** If the Province provided the Recipient with an opportunity to remedy the Event of Default pursuant to section A13.2(b), and:
 - (a) the Recipient does not remedy the Event of Default within the Notice Period:
 - (b) it becomes apparent to the Province that the Recipient cannot completely remedy the Event of Default within the Notice Period; or
 - (c) the Recipient is not proceeding to remedy the Event of Default in a way that is satisfactory to the Province,

the Province may extend the Notice Period, or initiate any one or more of the actions provided for in sections A13.2(a), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g), (h), and (i).

A13.5 **When Termination Effective.** Termination under Article will take effect as provided for in the Notice.

A14.0 FUNDS AT THE END OF A FUNDING YEAR

- A14.1 **Funds at the End of a Funding Year.** Without limiting any rights of the Province under Article A13.0, if the Recipient has not spent all of the Funds allocated for the Funding Year as provided for in the Budget, the Province may take one or both of the following actions:
 - (a) demand from the Recipient payment of the unspent Funds; and
 - (b) adjust the amount of any further instalments of Funds accordingly.

A15.0 FUNDS UPON EXPIRY

A15.1 **Funds Upon Expiry.** The Recipient will, upon expiry of the Agreement, pay to the Province any Funds remaining in its possession or under its control.

A16.0 DEBT DUE AND PAYMENT

A16.1 **Payment of Overpayment.** If at any time the Province provides Funds in excess of the amount to which the Recipient is entitled under the Agreement, the Province may:

- (a) deduct an amount equal to the excess Funds from any further instalments of Funds; or
- (b) demand that the Recipient pay an amount equal to the excess Funds to the Province.

A16.2 **Debt Due.** If, pursuant to the Agreement:

- (a) the Province demands from the Recipient the payment of any Funds or an amount equal to any Funds; or
- (b) the Recipient owes any Funds or an amount equal to any Funds to the Province, whether or not the Province has demanded their payment,

such Funds or other amount will be deemed to be a debt due and owing to the Province by the Recipient, and the Recipient will pay the amount to the Province immediately, unless the Province directs otherwise.

- A16.3 **Interest Rate.** The Province may charge the Recipient interest on any money owing by the Recipient at the then current interest rate charged by the Province of Ontario on accounts receivable.
- A16.4 **Payment of Money to Province.** The Recipient will pay any money owing to the Province by cheque payable to the "Ontario Minister of Finance" and delivered to the Province as provided for in Schedule "B".
- A16.5 **Fails to Pay.** Without limiting the application of section 43 of the *Financial Administration Act* (Ontario), if the Recipient fails to pay any amount owing under the Agreement, Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario may deduct any unpaid amount from any money payable to the Recipient by Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario.

A17.0 NOTICE

- A17.1 **Notice in Writing and Addressed.** Notice will be in writing and will be delivered by email, postage-prepaid mail, personal delivery, or fax, and will be addressed to the Province and the Recipient respectively as provided for Schedule "B", or as either Party later designates to the other by Notice.
- A17.2 **Notice Given.** Notice will be deemed to have been given:
 - (a) in the case of postage-prepaid mail, five Business Days after the Notice is mailed; or
 - (b) in the case of email, personal delivery, or fax, one Business Day after the Notice is delivered.
- A17.3 **Postal Disruption.** Despite section A17.2(a), in the event of a postal

disruption:

- (a) Notice by postage-prepaid mail will not be deemed to be given; and
- (b) the Party giving Notice will give Notice by email, personal delivery, or fax.

A18.0 CONSENT BY PROVINCE AND COMPLIANCE BY RECIPIENT

A18.1 **Consent.** When the Province provides its consent pursuant to the Agreement, it may impose any terms and conditions on such consent and the Recipient will comply with such terms and conditions.

A19.0 SEVERABILITY OF PROVISIONS

A19.1 **Invalidity or Unenforceability of Any Provision.** The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision of the Agreement will not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision of the Agreement. Any invalid or unenforceable provision will be deemed to be severed.

A20.0 WAIVER

- A20.1 **Waiver Request.** Either Party may, in accordance with the Notice provision set out in Article A17.0, ask the other Party to waive an obligation under the Agreement.
- A20.2 **Waiver Applies.** Any waiver a Party grants in response to a request made pursuant to section A20.1 will:
 - (a) be valid only if the Party granting the waiver provides it in writing; and
 - (b) apply only to the specific obligation referred to in the waiver.

A21.0 INDEPENDENT PARTIES

A21.1 **Parties Independent.** The Recipient is not an agent, joint venturer, partner, or employee of the Province, and the Recipient will not represent itself in any way that might be taken by a reasonable person to suggest that it is, or take any actions that could establish or imply such a relationship.

A22.0 ASSIGNMENT OF AGREEMENT OR FUNDS

- A22.1 **No Assignment.** The Recipient will not, without the prior written consent of the Province, assign any of its rights or obligations under the Agreement.
- A22.2 **Agreement Binding.** All rights and obligations contained in the Agreement will extend to and be binding on the Parties' respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and permitted assigns.

A23.0 GOVERNING LAW

A23.1 **Governing Law.** The Agreement and the rights, obligations, and relations of the Parties will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of Ontario and the applicable federal laws of Canada. Any actions or proceedings arising in connection with the Agreement will be conducted in the courts of Ontario, which will have exclusive jurisdiction over such proceedings.

A24.0 FURTHER ASSURANCES

A24.1 **Agreement into Effect.** The Recipient will provide such further assurances as the Province may request from time to time with respect to any matter to which the Agreement pertains, and will otherwise do or cause to be done all acts or things necessary to implement and carry into effect the terms and conditions of the Agreement to their full extent.

A25.0 JOINT AND SEVERAL LIABILITY

A25.1 **Joint and Several Liability.** Where the Recipient is comprised of more than one entity, all such entities will be jointly and severally liable to the Province for the fulfillment of the obligations of the Recipient under the Agreement.

A26.0 RIGHTS AND REMEDIES CUMULATIVE

A26.1 **Rights and Remedies Cumulative.** The rights and remedies of the Province under the Agreement are cumulative and are in addition to, and not in substitution for, any of its rights and remedies provided by law or in equity.

A27.0 FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH OTHER AGREEMENTS

A27.1 **Other Agreements.** If the Recipient:

- (a) has failed to comply with any term, condition, or obligation under any other agreement with Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario or one of Her agencies (a "Failure");
- (b) has been provided with notice of such Failure in accordance with the requirements of such other agreement;
- (c) has, if applicable, failed to rectify such Failure in accordance with the requirements of such other agreement; and
- (d) such Failure is continuing,

the Province may suspend the payment of Funds for such period as the Province determines appropriate.

A28.0 SURVIVAL

A28.1 **Survival.** The following Articles and sections, and all applicable cross-referenced sections and schedules, will continue in full force and effect for a period of seven years from the date of expiry or termination of the Agreement: Article 1.0, Article 3.0, Article A1.0 and any other applicable definitions, section A2.1(a), sections A4.2(d), A4.5, section A5.2, section A7.1 (to the extent that the Recipient has not provided the Reports or other reports as may have been requested to the satisfaction of the Province), sections A7.2, A7.3, A7.4, A7.5, A7.6, Article A8.0, Article A9.0, section A11.2, sections A12.2, A12.3, sections A13.1, A13.2(d), (e), (f), (g) and (h), Article A15.0, Article A16.0, Article A17.0, Article A19.0, section A22.2, Article A23.0, Article A25.0, Article A26.0, Article A27.0 and Article A28.0.

SCHEDULE "C" PROJECT

C.1.0 BACKGROUND

The Province established the Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (R.I.D.E.) Grant program to provide grants to various police services to enhance local enforcement capability and to ensure a year-round provincial program to conduct R.I.D.E. spot check activities.

C.2.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The purpose of the R.I.D.E. Grant program is to assist municipal police services, OPP municipal contract locations and First Nations police services in offsetting their staff costs for implementing R.I.D.E. programs of sobriety checks in their jurisdictions.

Funding is provided to assist with costs of staff overtime or paid duty for street-level enforcement activities in relation to the R.I.D.E. Grant program. Staffing funded will not include civilian or auxiliary officers.

The Recipient carries out a R.I.D.E. program of traffic stop sobriety checks in its jurisdiction and has applied for funding toward its R.I.D.E. program (the "Project"). The Province has accepted the Recipient's R.I.D.E. Grant Application, in whole or in part.

The Recipient agrees to undertake the Project in accordance with this Agreement and its Schedules.

SCHEDULE "D" BUDGET, PAYMENT PLAN AND REPORTING

D1.0 BUDGET

The Maximum Funds to be provided by the Province to the Recipient under this Agreement is set-out in Schedule "B". Funding is provided to assist with the costs of staff overtime or paid duty for street-level enforcement activities in relation to the R.I.D.E. Grant program.

D2.0 PAYMENT PLAN

The Province will provide the Recipient Funds, **up to the Maximum Funds** as set out in Schedule "B", on a one-time basis for the period from **April 1, 2019 to March 17, 2020**.

The Funds will be reimbursed to the Recipient following the Province's receipt and approval of the Final Report submitted by the Recipient.

D3.0 REPORTING

The Recipient shall provide the Province with a Final Report accounting in detail, all expenses for the activities for which the Funds were used as well as statistical information, in the forms set out in **Schedule** "E" by **March 19, 2020.**

Reports submitted after the deadline will not be considered for reimbursement. All R.I.D.E. activity eligible for reimbursement must be concluded on or before March 17, 2020. Any R.I.D.E. activity, which occurs between the period March 18, 2020 through March 31, 2020 may not be eligible for reimbursement.

D3.1 FINAL REPORT - FINANCIAL

Staff costs include overtime or paid duty for street level enforcement activities in relation to the program for which the Funds are provided. Staff will not include civilian or auxiliary officers.

For the Funds to reflect the amount of staff overtime or paid duty, a one-time financial report will be submitted to the Province by **March 19, 2020**, on the form attached to the Agreement as **Schedule "E"**. This financial report must be certified by a Municipal Clerk/Treasurer or a senior representative of the Recipient's financial services who can verify the accuracy of the claim.

The financial report will itemize the dates worked, name and rank of officers, rate of pay (basic hourly rate), number of overtime/paid duty hours worked, number of hours paid and total hours used by the police service for the period of **April 1**, **2019 to March 17**, **2020**.

D3.2 FINAL REPORT - STATISTICAL

The Recipient shall track and record key statistical information related to the R.I.D.E. Grant program and provide a statistical report to the Province by **March 19, 2020**, on the form attached to the Agreement as **Schedule "E"**.

D3.3 REPORT SUBMISSION AND TIMELINES

The Ontario Provincial Police Independent Review Panel has been appointed by the Government of Ontario through Order in Council 643/2019 to undertake an independent review of the workplace culture of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) in light of recent suicide deaths and mental health concerns of OPP members, as well as complaints about the workplace culture by current and former OPP staff.

We will be making recommendations on:

- The root causes and potential remedial actions to address the concerning rate of suicides, bullying and workplace harassment
- Concerns identified by frontline officers and other OPP staff that contribute to a negative workplace culture, and how those concerns have been or are being addressed
- How to improve the way complaints and concerns by frontline officers, civilian staff and the bargaining agents of the OPP are addressed by all levels of the organization

Re: Policies and Practices related to section 35 of the Police Services Act (PSA)

I write to you to bring to your attention the importance of ensuring that the board policies related to section 35 of the PSA accurately reflect the language in the act.

The ministry recently became aware that there are inconsistencies in board policies governing the proceedings of board meetings. As you may be aware, section 35 of the PSA requires all board meetings to be open to the public. A board may only exclude the public from all or part of a meeting in the following limited circumstances:

- Subsection 35(4) authorizes a police services board to exclude the public from all or part of a meeting if it is of the opinion that:
 - (a) matters involving public security may be disclosed and, having regard to the circumstances, the desirability of avoiding their disclosure in the public interest outweighs the desirability of adhering to the principle that proceedings be open to the public; or
 - (b) intimate financial or personal matters or other matters may be disclosed of such a nature, having regard to the circumstances, that the desirability of avoiding their disclosure in the interest of any person affected or in the public interest outweighs the desirability of adhering to the principle that proceedings be open to the public.

The ministry encourages police services boards to review its policies and/or procedural by-laws and practices in order to ensure compliance with section 35 of the PSA. You may also wish to consult with your legal counsel to ensure your policies/practices accurately reflect the language in section 35.

The Ministry of the Solicitor General (the Ministry) has received a number of queries regarding police services board members running in an election.

It is advisable that the board member disclose to his/her police services board the decision to be a candidate in the upcoming federal election as soon as possible. Members appointed by Lieutenant Governor in Council (LGIC) should also inform the Ministry as soon as possible.

It is the Ministry's position that a declaration of candidacy for the federal election is not necessarily cause for a board member's resignation. However, should a board member feel that, at any point in his/her political activity during the election period, he/she would be, or had the potential to be, in a real or perceived conflict of interest, it may warrant further consideration.

Should any individual police services board have its own rules and procedures related to this issue, including those developed in accordance with s.37 of the *Police Services Act*, the board member or the board may wish to discuss this particular situation with their legal counsel. The board member might also wish to consult with the municipality to determine if there are any municipal by-laws related to this issue.

All members of a police services board should review Ontario Regulation 421/97 *Members of Police Services Boards – Code of Conduct.*
