G. OPP Monthly Report

Staff Sgt. Jamie Smith provided a summary of the OPP Report for the month of August 2019.

Sgt. Smith noted that POA traffic charges were up significantly for the month, as measurable traffic enforcement goals were established and met for both Tecumseh and Lakeshore.

The members discussed possible solutions to the continually increasing number of 911 misdials, which are trending 63% higher compared to 2018 (YTD), including the potential to lay charges and communications companies implementing a two-step verification process.

Member Paul Sweet inquired if the OPP employs part time officers. Sgt. Smith explained that retiring officers are given the option of re-applying for part time work without loss of qualifications, but there are no part time officers at the local detachment.

Mayor McNamara expressed appreciation to Staff Sgt. Smith for special assistance provided to a local family to attend Fire Prevention Week, following their experience of a racist episode in a Town park.

K. Old Business

1. 2020 Police and PSB Budget

CAO Marg Misek-Evans provided an overview of the proposed 2020 Police and Police Services Board Budget.

Chair Hales raised the issue of potential funding for amalgamation discussions. CAO Marg Misek-Evans responded that, after discussion at the Area CAO Meeting, the plan is to proceed with an initial meeting but subsequent actions are unclear at this time. Therefore, additional funding has not been included in the proposed 2020 budget.

The CAO will work with the Chair in developing a presentation for Council at the November 12, 2019 Council Meeting.

2. Community Safety and Wellbeing Plan - CAO Update

The CAO and Recording Secretary attended a full day training workshop in London on October 9 on the development of CSWB Plans hosted by the Municipal Crime Prevention Network. The workshop emphasized that municipal leadership is critical to the success of the planning process and that police are just one of many multi-sectoral partners.

CAO Marg Misek-Evans further reported that the CSWB Planning process was discussed at the area CAO meeting held on September 27, 2019. The consensus was for the County of Essex to approach the City of Windsor to jointly undertake this Plan, with individual appendices for each municipality. Once this joint approach is confirmed, the Essex CAO will approach County Council for one-time funding; area municipalities may have to fund some additional local consultation.

3. Essex County PSB Amalgamation Discussion - CAO Update

CAO Marg Misek-Evans noted that this matter was discussed at the recent area CAO meeting. The CAO and Recording Secretary will move forward with organizing the initial meeting of Mayors and Board Chairs.

4. Presentation by OPP Municipal Policing Bureau at October 8, 2019 SCM

There was general discussion on the OPP's presentation to Council on October 8, 2019, in particular the status of OPP contracts following full implementation of the new policing legislation.

5. Media and Web streaming Training - November 6, 2019

CAO Marg Misk-Evans confirmed that the training on Media and Web streaming will take place as a Special Council Meeting, at the rescheduled time of 3:00 to 9:00 p.m. on November 6th in Council Chambers.

1. 911 Misdials

Stemming from the discussion on OPP monthly reports, the following resolution on 911 Misdials arose.

Whereas the calls for service for 911 Misdials have risen dramatically in recent years, correlated with the rise in cell phone use; and

Whereas 911 Misdials must be responded to as if they were legitimate emergency calls; and

Whereas each 911 call is responded to with two OPP officers at an average time per call of 1.2 hours; and

Whereas each 911 call is a billable call to the municipality; and

Whereas in 2019 alone to date, 911 Misdials in Tecumseh number 1,082 calls, which is 28.8% of all billable calls for service to date; and

Whereas 911 Misdials are not unique to Tecumseh and in fact are common across the Province at an estimated cost of millions of dollars;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved That the Tecumseh Police Services Board request Town Council to approach the Federal and Provincial governments and associations, including but not limited to, the Ontario Association of Police Services Boards (OAPSB), the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP), the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), to lobby the telecommunications industry to develop a solution to 911 Misdials.

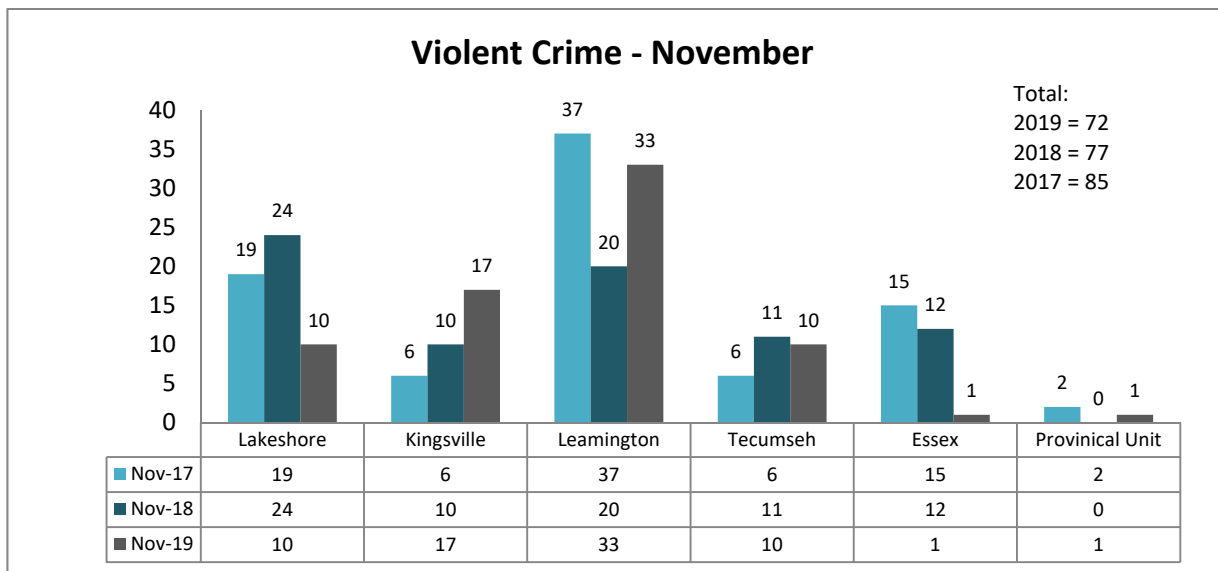

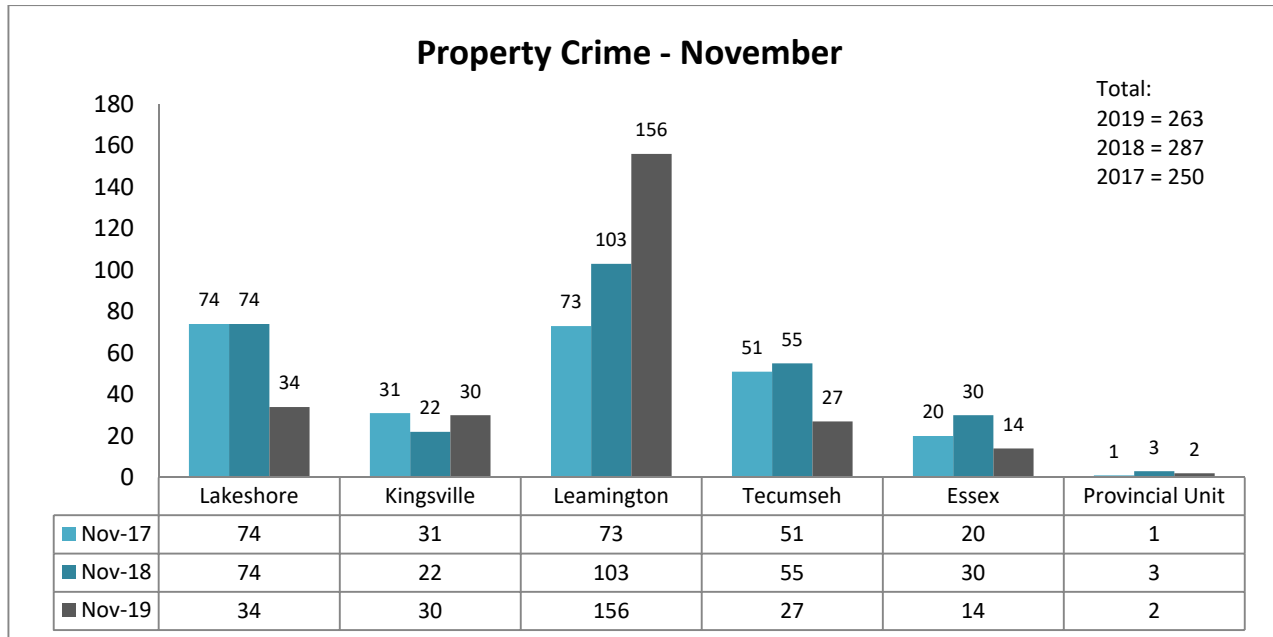

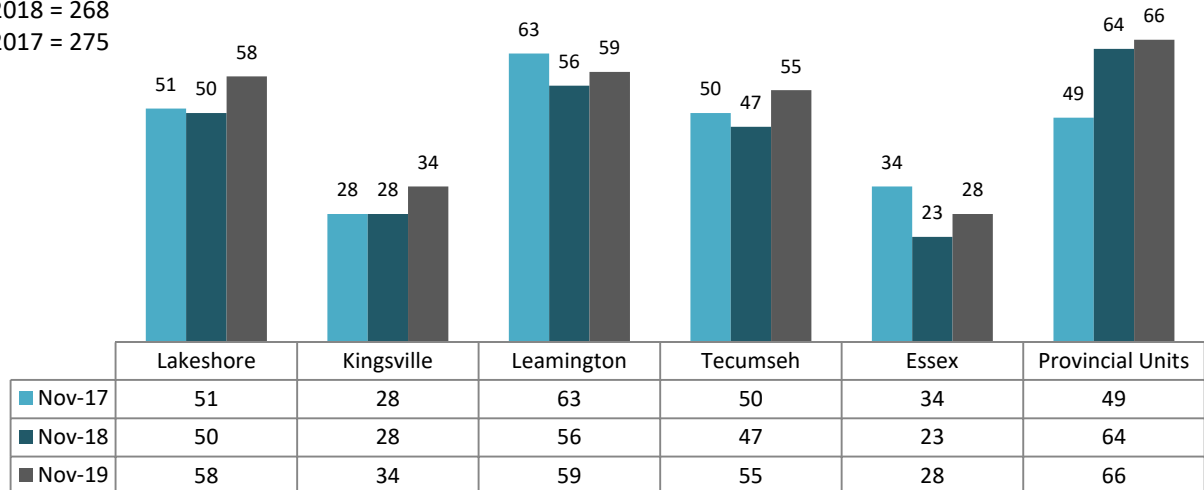

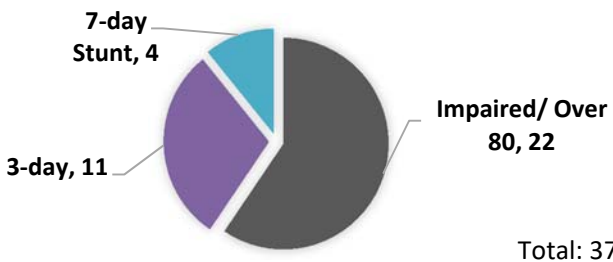

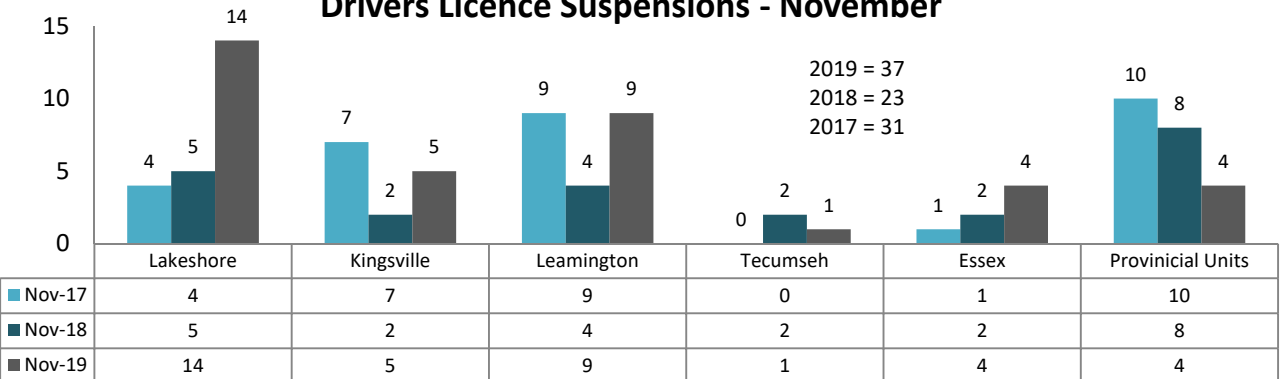

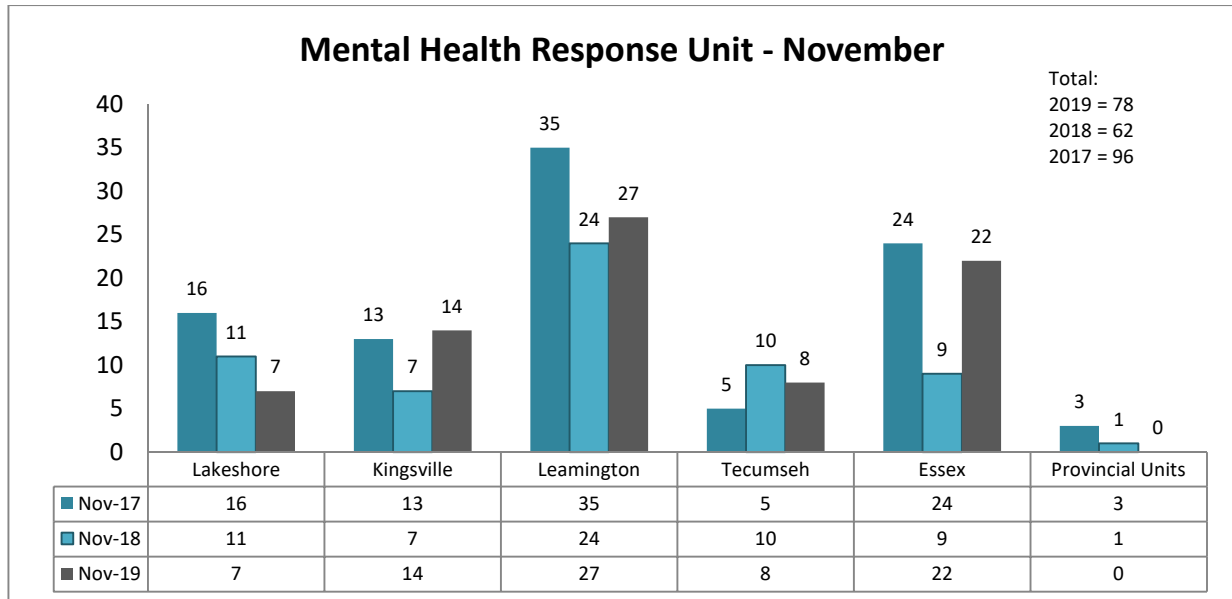

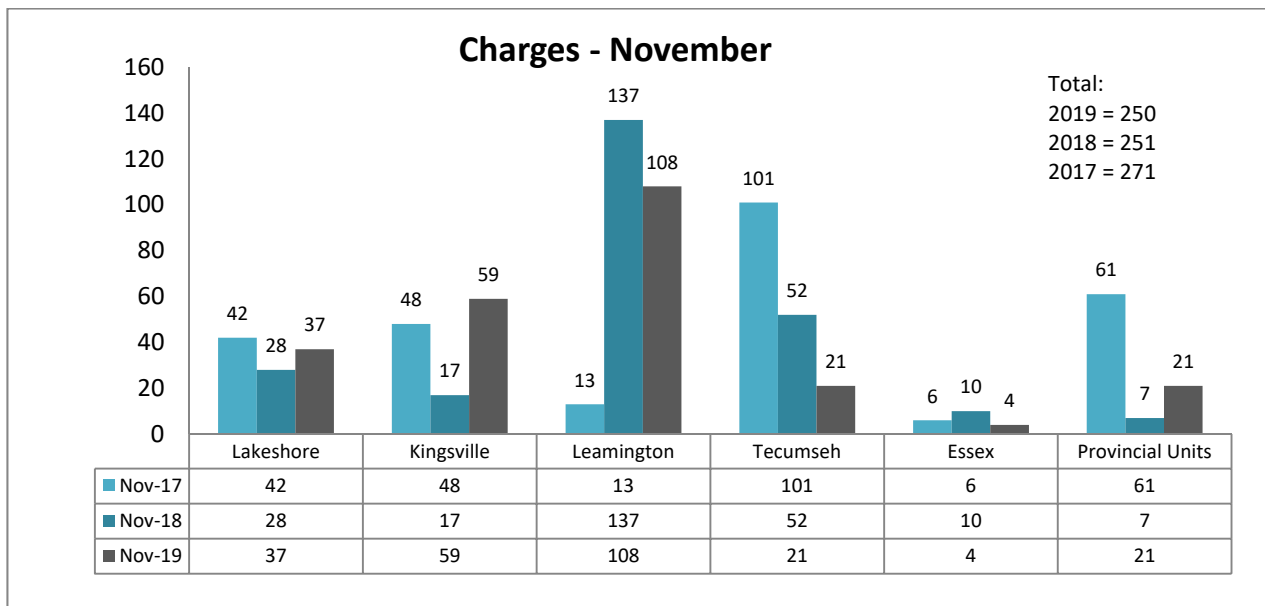


MHRU Calls for Service¹¹

- Charges in November 2019 are similar to charges in November 2018

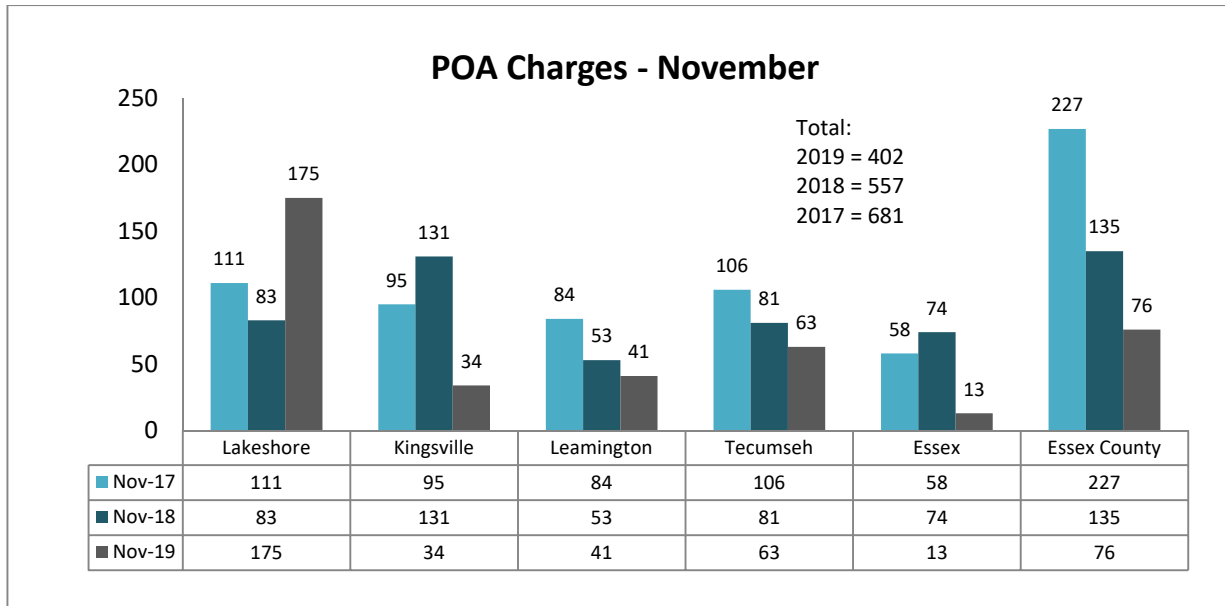

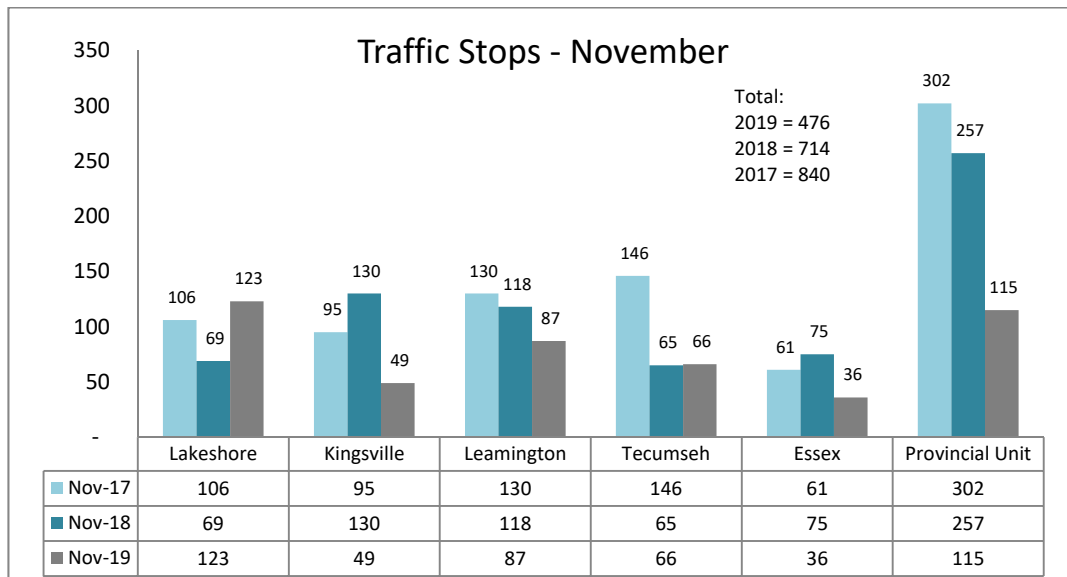

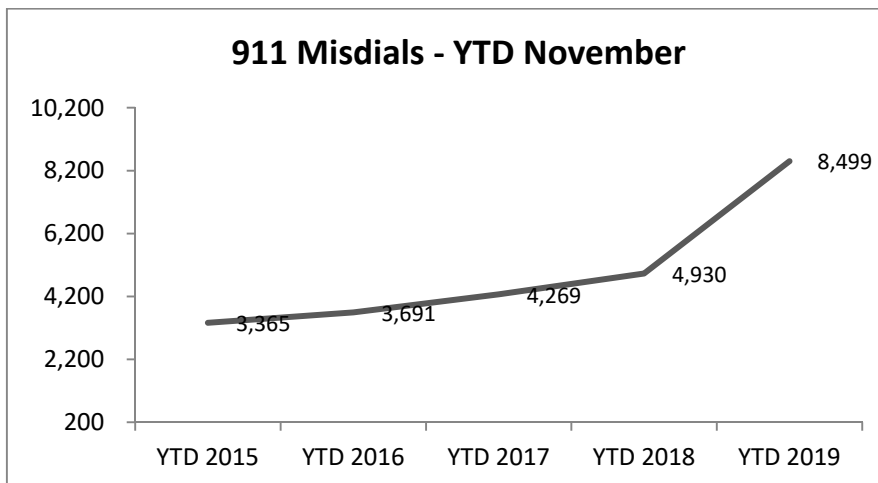

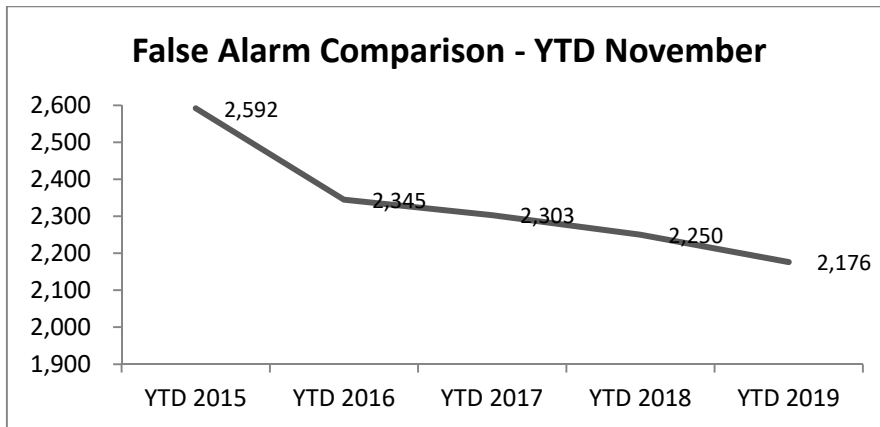

Notable Investigations

Lakeshore	A young adult was stabbed with an edged weapon and robbed of cash at his residence. An extensive investigation remains ongoing across jurisdictions.
	K9 Maximus assisted in the search of a suicidal male that overdosed on fentanyl and left his residence on foot. K9 and ERT members located the male in a field where he was transported to hospital.
Kingsville	Two males from Windsor were charged with Possess Property Obtained by Crime x3, Use Credit Card x4 and Fail to Comply with Probation Order x3 after a rash of thefts from motor vehicles
	A 37 yr. old male from Windsor has been arrested and charged with Theft Under after having attended two different gas stations and stole trays of lottery tickets valued at more than \$700.
Essex	After a lengthy investigation, three males have been charged after a September robbery in which a male sustained a gunshot wound. The victim, and two other associates were charged with Robbery using a Firearm, Public Mischief, and Possession of a Weapon Dangerous. One male was additionally charged with Disguise with Intent, Fail to Comply, Pointing a Firearm and Discharge a Firearm while the other was additionally charged with Possession of Cocaine.
Tecumseh	Officers responded to a 911 call with an invalid callback number, in which the caller sounded like they were having a hard time talking. A history search was used to locate a possible address. Officers attended and breached the door to find an 89 yr. old male in medical distress.
	Officers responded to an unwanted person call at a local fast food restaurant. A 37 yr. old female was located in the washroom in possession of suspected purple fentanyl. She was transported to hospital as a precaution and released on a Promise to Appear for Possession of a Schedule I Substance. The female was then turned over to Windsor Police to execute their own arrest warrant.
	Members of the Community Street Crime Unit continue to investigate a robbery at Subway in which employees were locked in the freezer and a quantity of cash stolen.
Leamington	Two separate search warrants were executed on Mill St E and Talbot St E. During the first warrant, 3 males and 1 female were arrested for Trafficking Cocaine. A quantity of cocaine, cash and evidence of trafficking was seized. During the second warrant, K9 Maximus additionally located crystal meth in a boot under a night stand. The female occupant was charged with Trafficking Cocaine and Possession of Crystal Meth.
	Officers responded to a report of a suspicious male going house-to-house and rummaging through vehicles. The 25 yr. old male was located and charged with Theft, Possession of Break In Instruments, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, Fail to Comply with Probation Order and Trespass at Night. This same male was charged with B&E/Theft for two other events in August 2019.

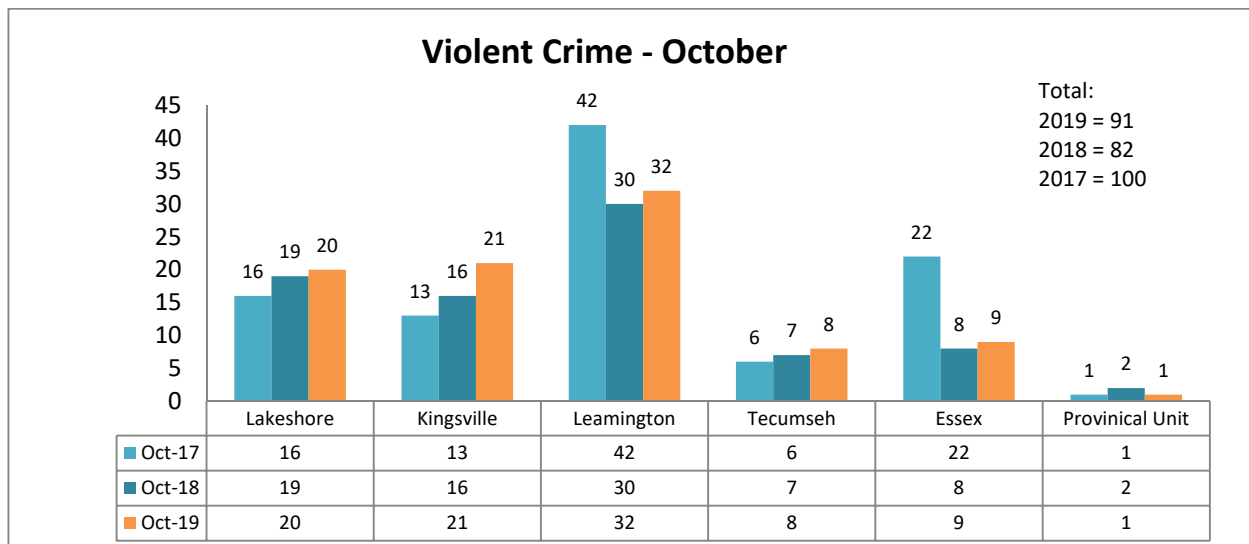

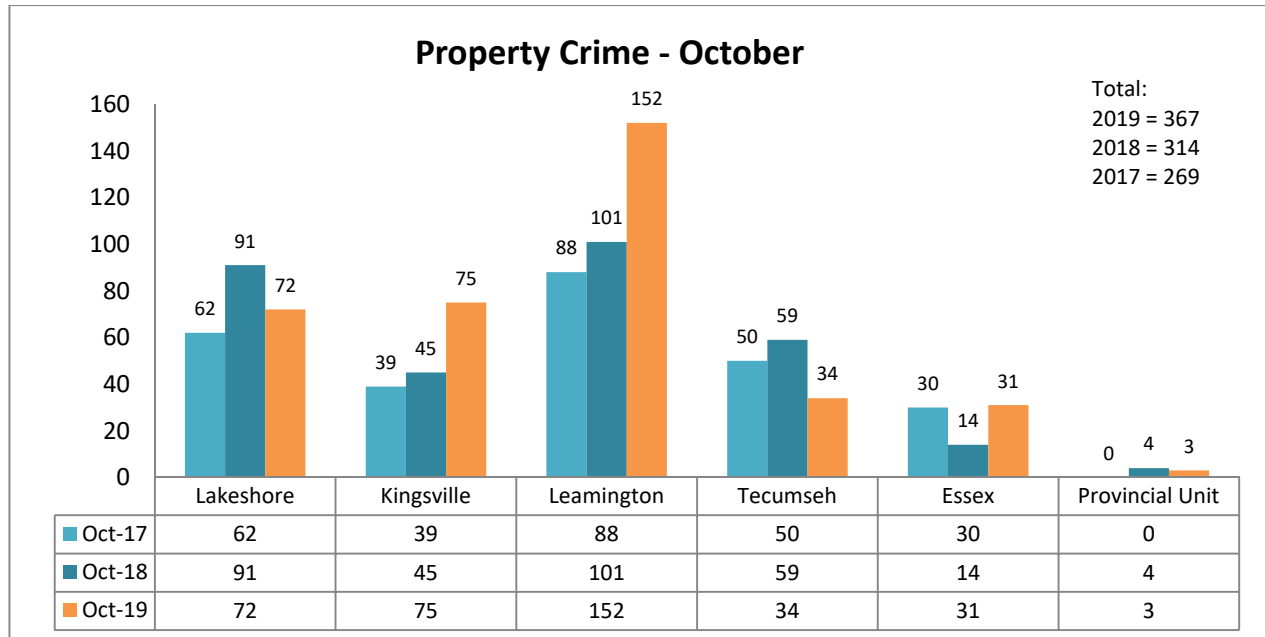

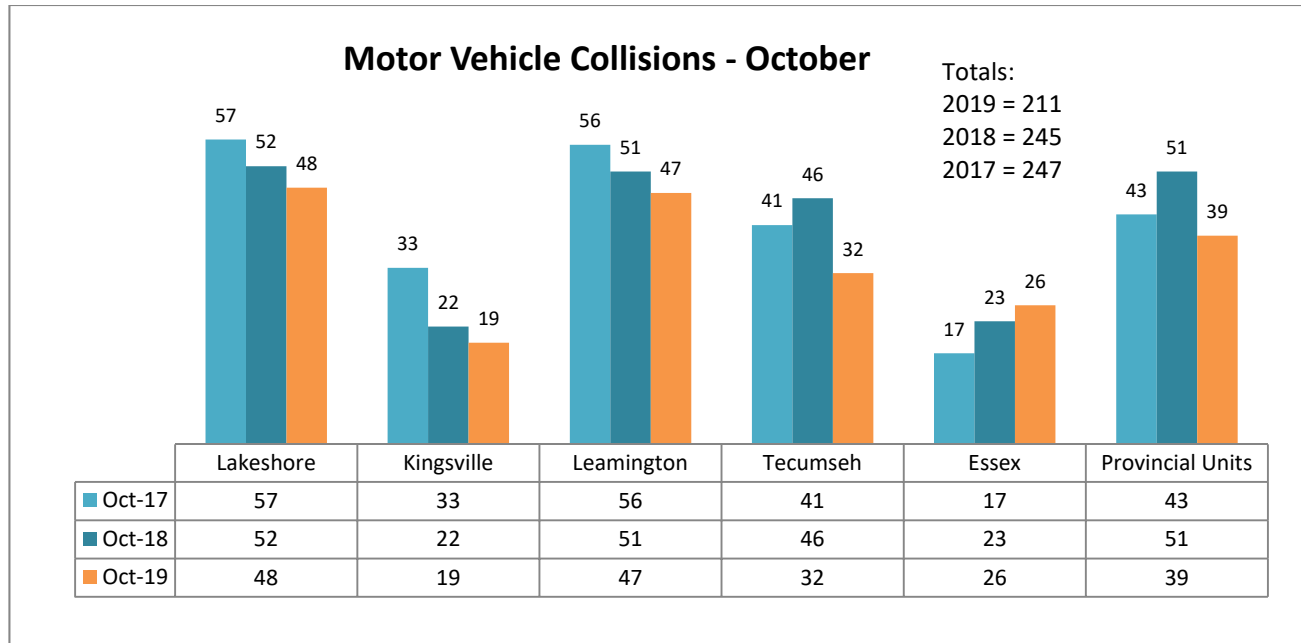

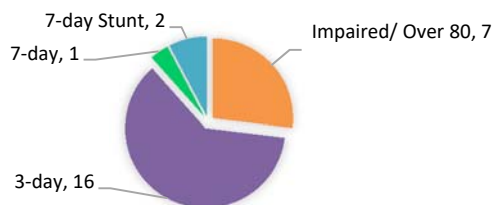

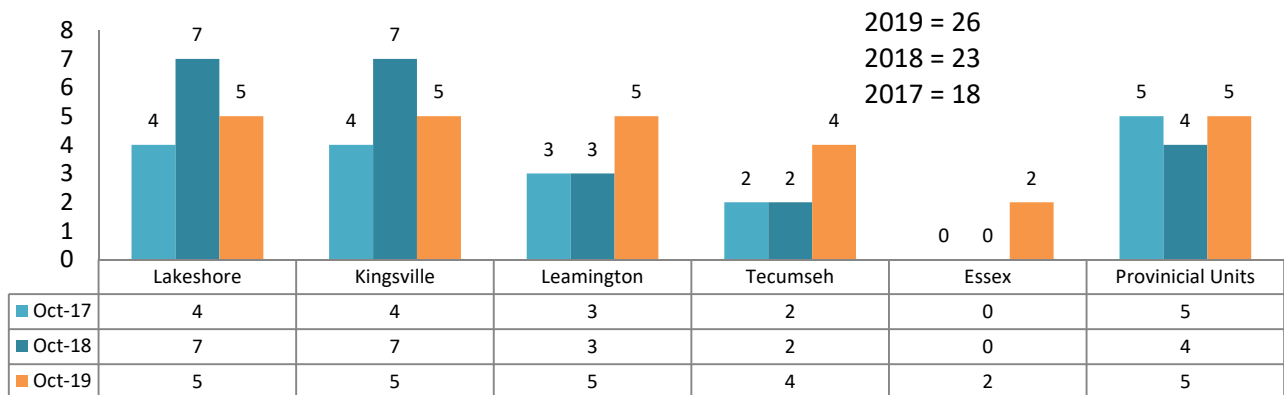

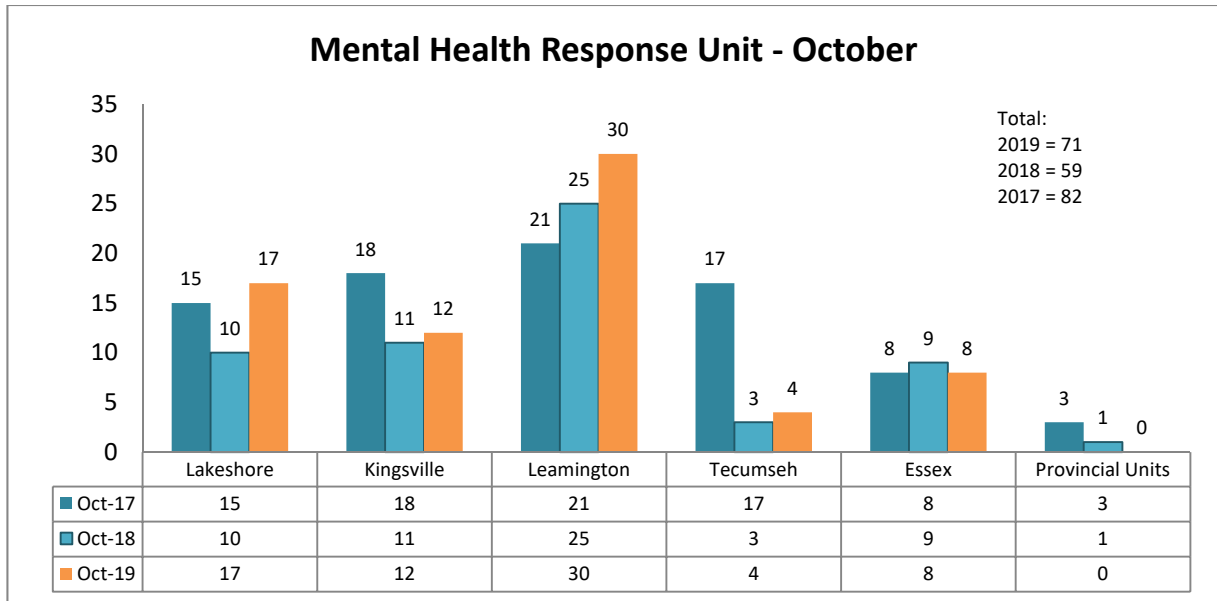

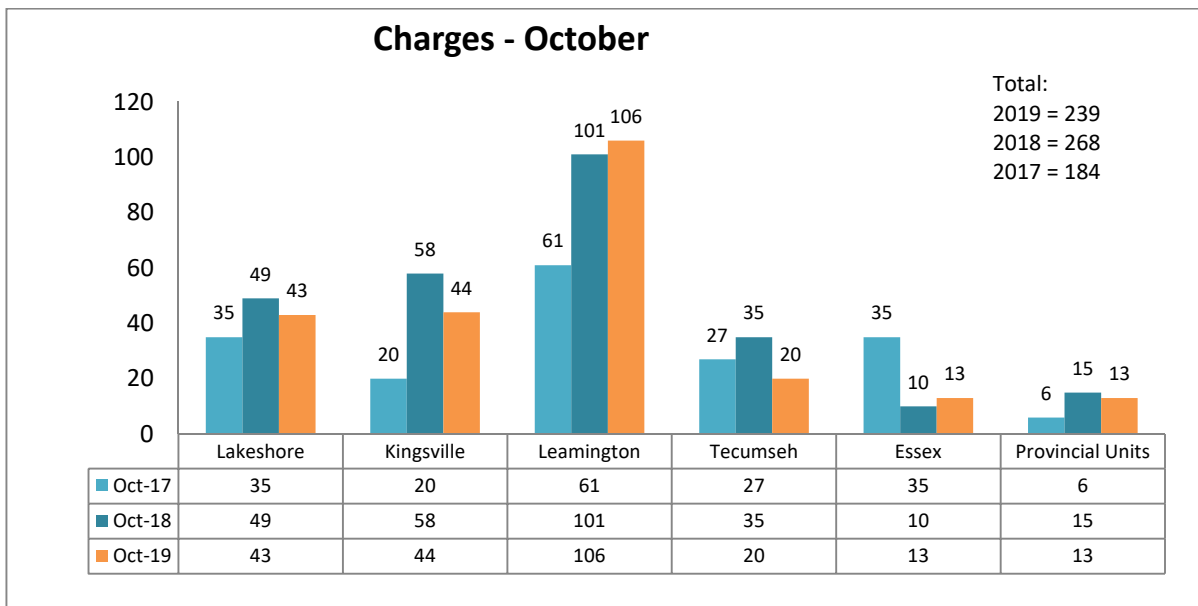

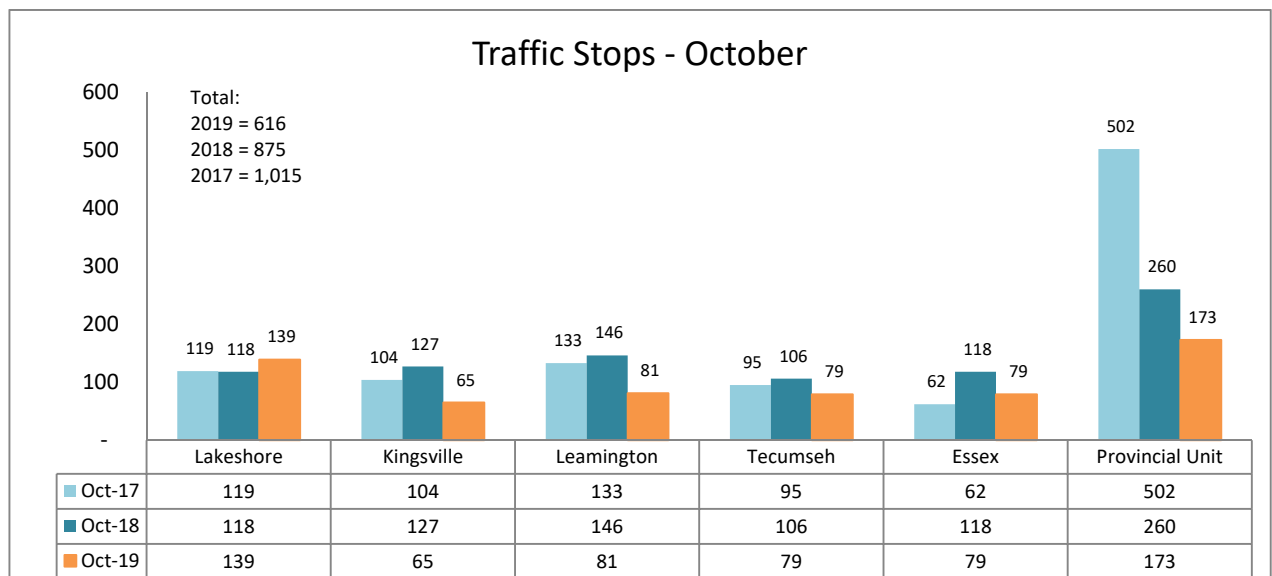

Notable Investigations

Lakeshore	A 48 yr. old female from Windsor has been arrested and charged with multiple counts of Theft, Use Credit Card and Possession of stolen property after a crime spree involving more than 10 stolen vehicles and 40 reports of theft from unlocked vehicles in Lakeshore, Tecumseh, Kingsville and Essex over the past two months. Three males have been also charged for their role in these many of the offences. Countless other victims were affected but did not directly report the events to police.
	A young male has been charge with multiple counts of Uttering Threats and Criminal Harassment after a relationship ended. The male had been involved in numerous incidents and warned over the past year.
Kingsville	A vehicle stop on County Road 31 to check for sobriety resulted in two men from Markham being charged under the Cannabis Act for Possession Over 30g when they were found to have more than 900g.
Essex	Three men from Windsor and Lakeshore have been charged with Robbery Using a Firearm after a call to EMS reporting a male with a gunshot wound in the community of McGregor. All three were charged after a lengthy investigation in which one of the males was additionally charged with Disguise with Intent, Pointing a Firearm and Discharge a Firearm Into or at a Place.
Tecumseh	A 66 yr. old male has been charged with 4 counts of Careless Storage of a Firearm and 1 count of Careless Storage of Ammunition resulting from a separate police investigation.
Multiple	A 48 yr. old female from Windsor has been arrested and charged with multiple counts of Theft, Use Credit Card and Possession of stolen property after a crime spree involving more than 10 stolen vehicles and 40 reports of theft from unlocked vehicles in Lakeshore, Kingsville and Essex over the past two months. Three males, also from Windsor, have been also charged for their participation in these offences.
Leamington	With the help of the public and a lengthy investigation, officers have identified, arrested and charged a 23 yr. old male with Fail to Stop at an Accident, Causing Death after striking an 85 year old woman in a wheelchair as she crossed a controlled intersection and fleeing the scene. The female passed away in hospital as a result of her injuries. A company vehicle has been seized as evidence.
	A 33 yr. old male from Leamington has been charged with Arson – Disregard for Human Life after setting fire to a multi-unit residence on Queens Avenue. The office of the Ontario Fire Marshall assisted in the investigation and deemed the sole ignition source was an open flame which was started in the attic area.

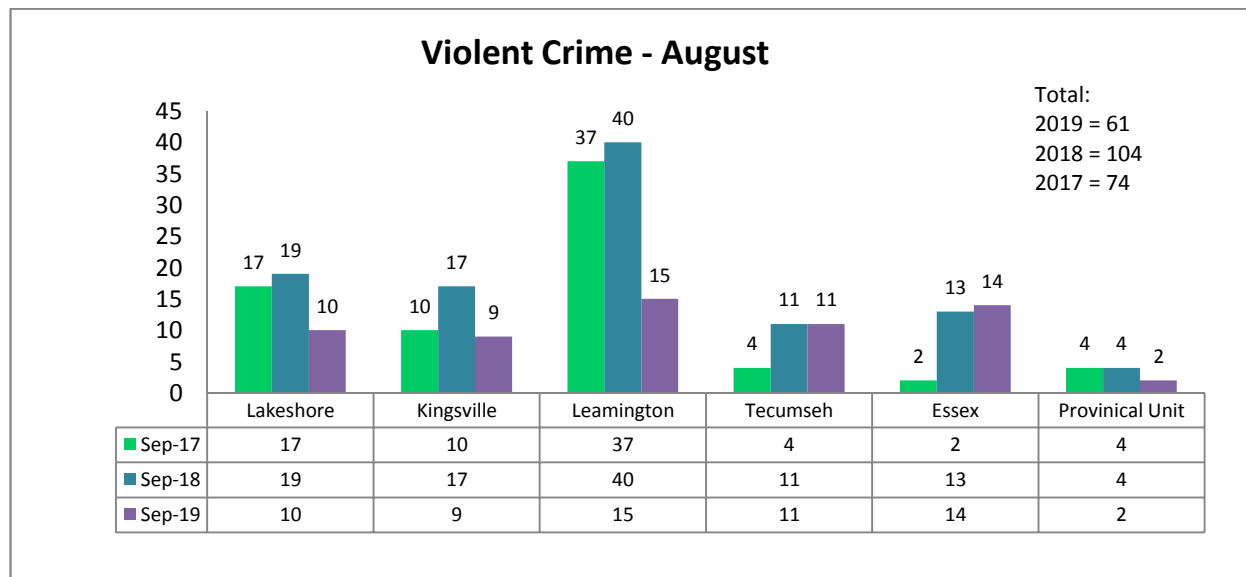

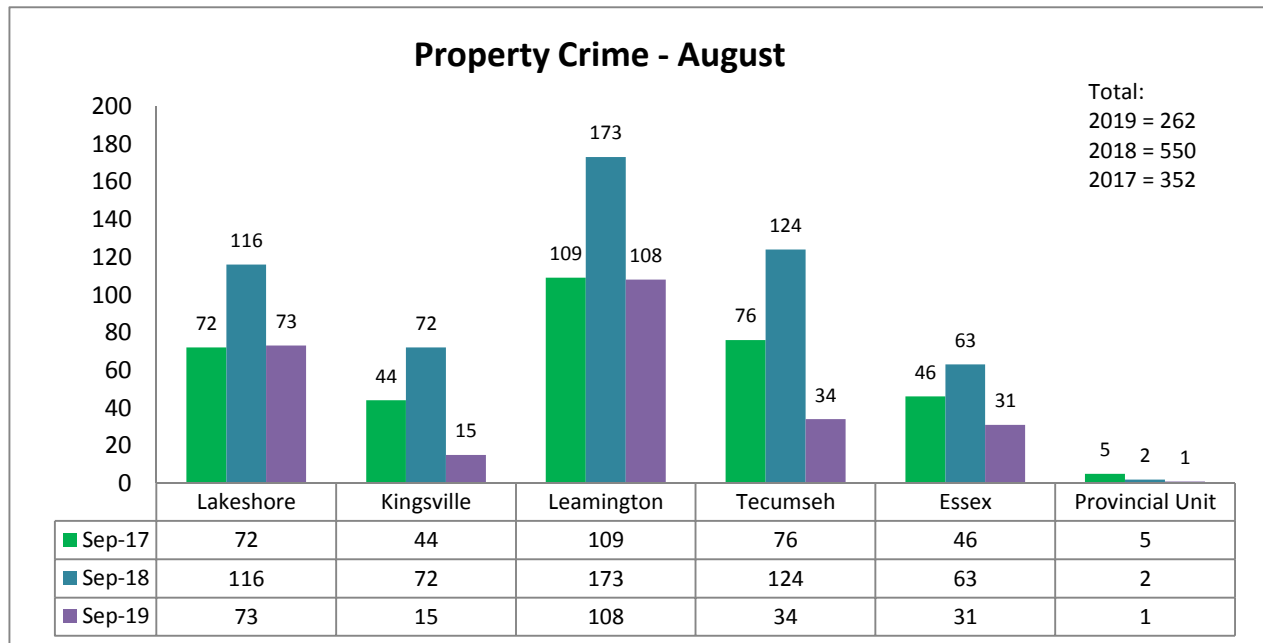

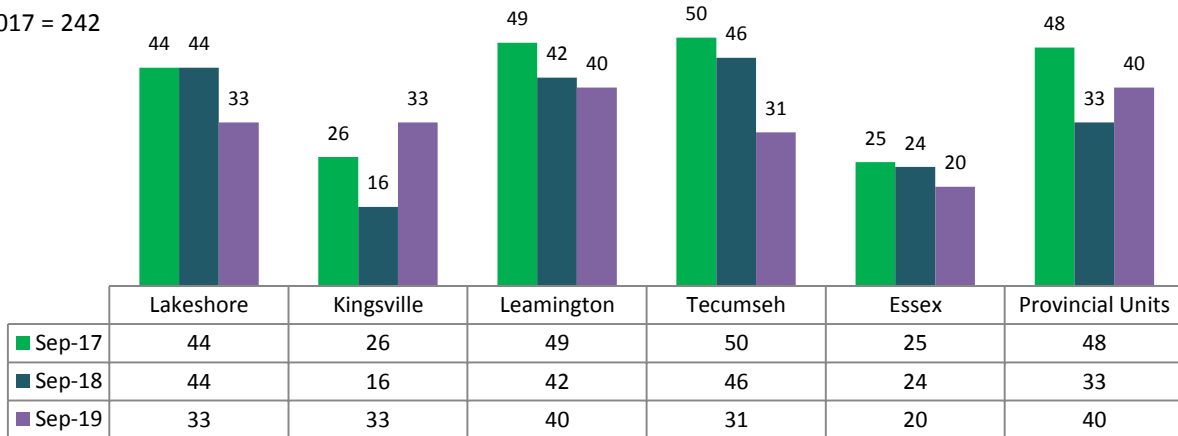

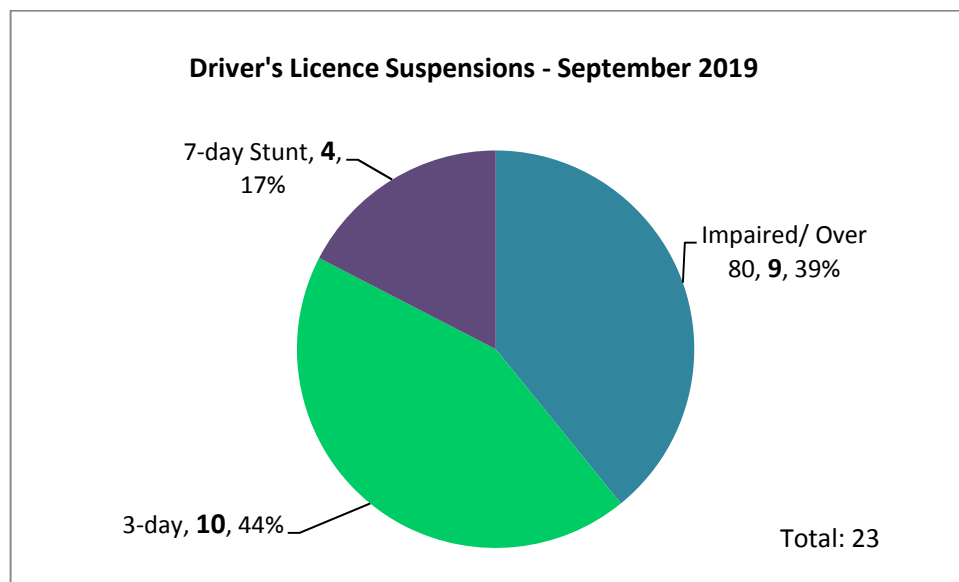

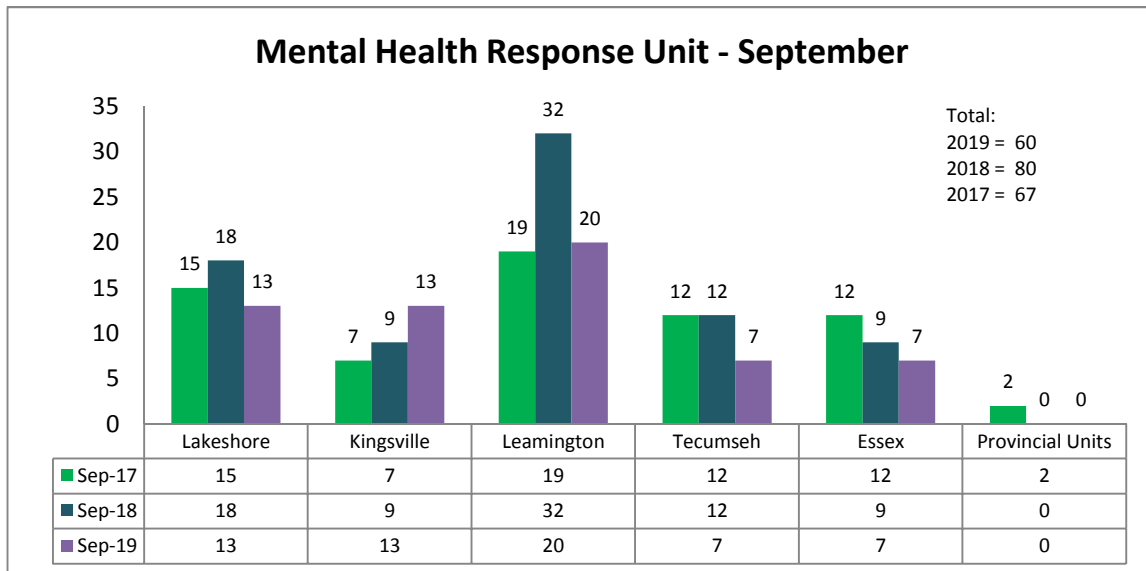

MHRU Calls for Service¹¹



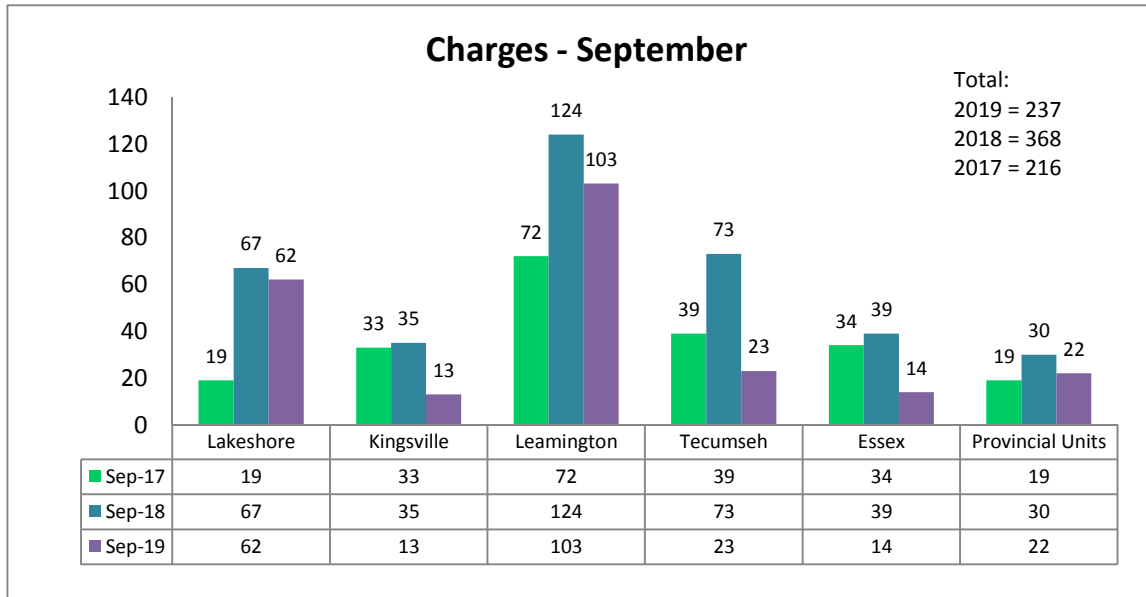

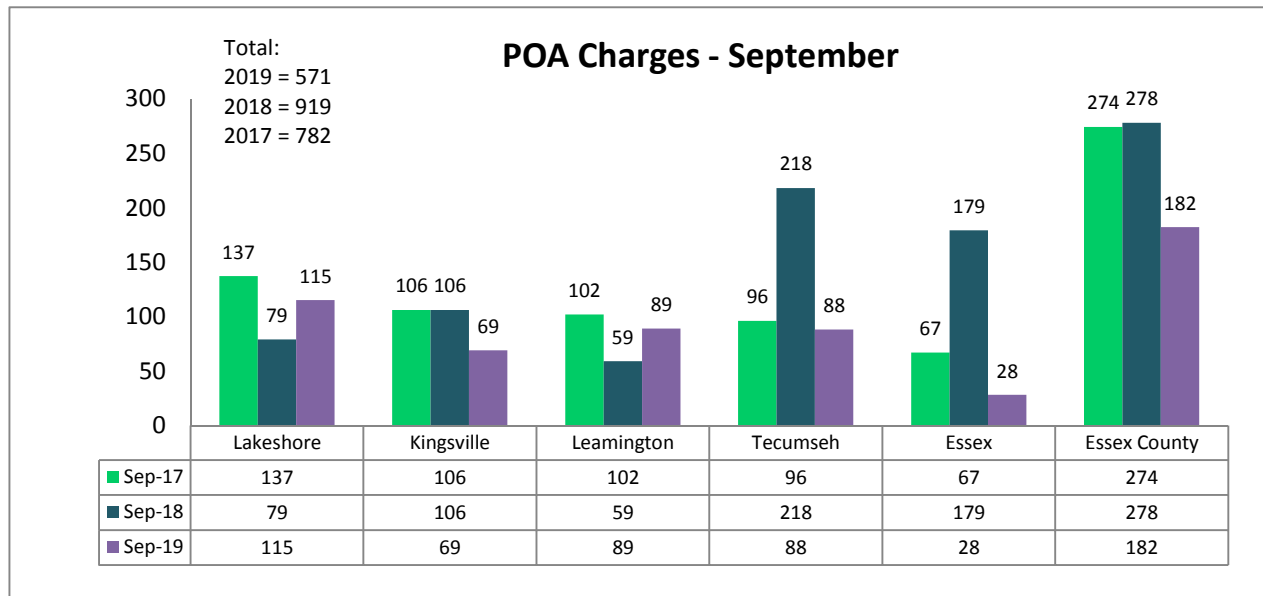

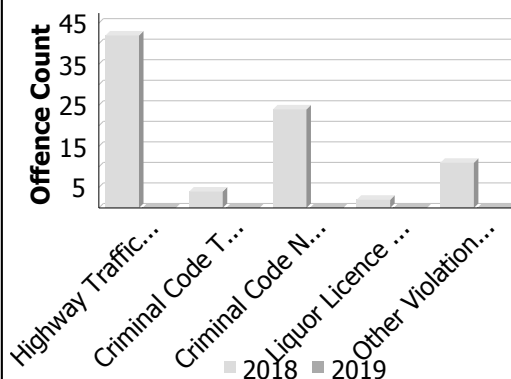
Lakeshore	Several unlocked vehicles were entered overnight and property stolen. Video evidence from the use of credit and bank cards confirmed the identities of a 30 year old male and 48 year old woman, both from Windsor. The female has been involved in other events the county. The male has been arrested & charged with 5 counts of Use Credit card and 2 counts of Theft. The female remains Wanted.
	An officer on routine patrol stopped a suspicious truck pulling an enclosed trailer. The driver, with a history of criminality, and was unable to satisfy the officer as to the ownership of the trailer. As a result, the trailer was held and later confirmed to have been stolen a short time earlier and just a short distance away.
Kingsville	A 53 yr. old male was charged with Assault, Forcible Confinement and Breach after an incident with his estranged girlfriend. She suffered only minor injuries.
Essex	Crime unit members continue to investigate a serious event in which a 30 yr. old male sustained a single gunshot wound. The victim suffered a significant injury but is expected to recover.
Tecumseh	A 31 yr. old male from Windsor was arrested and charged with 4 counts of Invitation to Sexual Touching after reports of suspicious black SUV approaching young female children.
	A 25 yr. old male was charged with Inciting Hatred after approaching and making comments to a family from an identifiable group while at a public park. This same male was charged with Assault after approaching another person and their child and making threatening gestures and comment. MHRU has been engaged.
	A business in the Oldcastle area reported a B&E in which the chain link fence was cut and the locks cut to two storage containers. Over \$5,000 in tools were taken. Ident processed the scene and was able to locate fingerprints which matched to a known criminal. A 25 yr. old man from Essex was arrested and charged.
Marine	Marine officers conducted 23 Directed Patrols and Calls for Service.
Leamington	Two separate CDSA search warrants were executed in Leamington resulting in the seizure of powdered cocaine and more than \$18,000 in currency.
	A 27 yr. old female and 32 yr. old male from Windsor shoplifted over \$1,200 from a retail business. As police arrived, both fled on foot in separate directions. The female was apprehended and a warrant has been obtained for the male. Both individuals involved in other occurrences throughout the municipalities.
	A 38 yr. old female has been charged with 2 counts of Theft, Disguise with Intent and B&E after dressing and presenting herself as the personal-care worker of a long-term care resident. The female was observed on camera and identified as a care worker who had been previously fired by an outside agency.

Community Safety & Policing Act 2019

O.P.P. detachment board

67 (1) There shall be an O.P.P. detachment board, or more than one O.P.P. detachment board in accordance with the regulations, for each detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police that provides policing in a municipality or in a First Nation reserve.

OPP Detachment Boards

Police Services Act (1990)

- Every municipality in Ontario that maintains its own police service, or is policed by the OPP *under contract*, is required to have a police services board (about 160+ communities)
- Municipalities that are policed by the OPP *without a contract* currently do not have a police services board, but may have a community policing advisory committee (about 220+ communities)

Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019

- Creates a requirement for one OPP detachment board per OPP detachment with requirements for community representation and input, or more than one per detachment if provided in the regulations
- Flexibility is provided through regulation to address unique geographic circumstances

OPP Detachment Boards

Police Services Act (1990)

- 3 or 5 member boards
- Participate in selection of the detachment commander

Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019

- Board composition, terms of office and remuneration to be provided in the regulations.
- consult with the Commissioner regarding the selection of a detachment commander and otherwise participate, in accordance with the regulations, in the selection of the detachment commander

Local Policies and Action Plan

Police Services Act (1990)

- Duties of section 10 boards include determining policing objectives and priorities, and establishing local policies, after consulting the detachment commander or designate

Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019

- Boards are empowered to determine local objectives, priorities and policies subject to specifications outlined in the statute, including:
 - Must consult with Detachment Commander
 - It must not be inconsistent with, the strategic plan prepared by the Solicitor General for the OPP;
 - Must not relate to specific investigations, the conduct of specific operations or other prescribed matters;
 - Must not require a member of the OPP to provide any policing that is not required as a component of adequate and effective policing.

Local Policies and Action Plan

Investing in Community Safety Across the Province*New grant program to support police services and local priorities*

CAMBRIDGE — The Ontario government is providing police services across the province with the resources they need to combat crime and keep communities safe by investing \$195 million through the province's new Community Safety and Policing (CSP) Grant program over the next three years.

Through the local priorities funding stream, 89 police services boards will be allocated a total of \$181 million to address issues that were identified by their communities as local areas of focus. These include collaboration between the police and community organizations to help individuals suffering from mental health issues and addictions (e.g., mobile crisis response teams), as well as programs to combat impaired driving, property crime and other public safety concerns. In addition, approximately \$14 million will be allocated to 18 police services boards under the provincial priorities funding stream to address gun and gang violence, sexual violence and harassment, and human trafficking.

"Our police services and their partners know best what they need to combat crime in their communities," said Sylvia Jones, Solicitor General. "The investment we are making today will help deploy additional frontline officers and take action where and when it is needed most."

Of the \$195 million investment, approximately \$8.5 million will help Waterloo Regional Police Service expand its Community Oriented Response and Enforcement Teams and set up a new team under its Gang Intelligence and Enforcement Initiative. These teams will play a crucial role in strengthening community safety in the Waterloo Region and in ramping up the fight against gun and gang violence.

"We are grateful that the Ontario government recognizes the need to fund and support public safety here in Waterloo Region," said Bryan Larkin, Chief of Police for the Waterloo Regional Police Service. "This funding will allow us to continue combating violent crime in our community and allow us to ensure the individuals responsible are brought to justice."

"Crime, and especially gun and gang violence, knows no geographical boundaries," said Jones. "That's why it is so important that we continue putting resources directly into the hands of police

services across the province. They are the experts in maintaining public safety and our primary partners in keeping Ontario communities safe."

This investment builds on the \$105.4 million both the provincial and federal governments have invested to date to combat gun and gang violence across the province through the Ontario Guns, Gangs and Violence Reduction Strategy.

QUICK FACTS

- Police services will be required to report annually on the outcomes of their initiatives, such as an increase in support for front-line officers and/or an increase in community safety and well-being, for both the local and provincial priorities funding streams of the CSP grant program.
- The grant funding will help police services pay for personnel, training, equipment, engagement and education as well as research and analysis.

THE CIVILIANIZATION OF PUBLIC SAFETY FUNCTIONS

Today, the Macdonald Laurier Institute released its latest contribution to policing policy. The paper's author, Dr. Christian Leuprecht, has written extensively on the rising cost of policing in Canada. He has spoken at various AMO events and met with AMO's Policing Modernization Task Force in 2015. One key task force recommendation is to permit the greater transfer of specific non-core policing functions to civilians or other security providers where appropriate. The paper, called "Where to draw the blue line? How civilians and contractors can let police do the policing" speaks to that in greater detail. Dr. Leuprecht writes a summary below.

Stressed municipal budgets, expanding public expectations, growing complexity of police services, and mounting salary pressures are all driving calls to reform the way policing services are delivered.

The costs of policing services and the cost drivers are multivariate; there is no simple solution for reform. On the one hand, reformists tout "civilianization," privatization, and contracting as possible game-changers to contain rising costs, improve service delivery, and deliver community safety outcomes. On the other hand, law-and-order traditionalists – police associations and chiefs first and foremost among them – deem alternative service delivery (ASD) a disruptor. But many industries and sectors are being disrupted by technology and new business models, including crime. Why not policing?

This study examines the current and potential contribution of alternative service delivery to what is commonly known as non-core policing functions. Initially the study frames the problem that is driving this discussion. It reviews alternative service delivery, distinguishes among three of its key concepts (civilianization, privatization, and contracting out), and examines how alternative service delivery applies to policing. Two propositions distinguish alternative service delivery from non-core policing: that police have been providing services that are not, at their core, policing services, or that police are not optimized to deliver; and that, normatively, in a democracy, such services are problematic insofar as they constitute unwarranted intervention by the state in people's lives. Indeed, the public has an intuitive sense of how core a service really is: popular support is higher for uniformed police to deliver services involving Criminal Code offenses than to deliver other services such as security at public events.

To this end, the study details the sort of services that are already being delivered under non-core policing and the associated gains in efficiency and effectiveness that come from switching to alternative service delivery for non-core policing. To illustrate the point, this study examines a series of case studies drawn from across Canadian cities. Together, they show the range of services that civilians are already delivering around the country on behalf of police services. Unsurprisingly, the approaches and extent of service delivery vary across the country. Nonetheless, it turns out that the “civilianization of service delivery” (i.e., giving civilians the task of carrying out some policing functions) that is highly contentious and hotly debated in one place has long been delivered successfully elsewhere. To be sure, the greatest obstacles to change come from police associations and chiefs who are stiffly resisting the efforts of legislators and other civilian authorities to implement new approaches. Still, albeit limited and unsystematic, there is actually more evidence than one might expect from across Canada on alternative service delivery in policing and the delivery of non-core policing by civilians.

The study contains several key findings. First, there is much confusion about concepts such as privatization, civilianization, and contracting; the study explains those concepts in depth, which will help ensure that the public discourse on alternative service delivery and non-core policing is clear and sensible.

Second, what may be acceptable and appropriate in one context may not be doable in another, but the study emphasizes that better and more systematic evidence will go a long way toward alleviating such concerns from the public, associations, and the law enforcement members.

Third, evidence shows that many of the concerns raised about alternative service delivery can be addressed with proper, enforceable contracts and careful selection of a qualified, appropriate, experienced alternative service delivery provider, especially if that provider’s personnel are drawn from retired police or military members who are already experienced and understand the policing culture.

Fourth, while it may be tempting to think of alternative service delivery primarily in terms of efficiencies, observations from across the country indicate that non-core policing really provides a more effective service delivery with better outcomes, which enables police services to reinvest the money and personnel they save in the uniformed service. As such, rather than positing non-core policing as zero-sum in which non-core policing’s gains are losses for traditional policing services, research shows that non-core policing is actually positive-sum for police and communities alike.

Finally, the study points out that the legislative environment to enable non-core policing varies across the country, sets different standards and expectations, and in many cases exposes municipalities to potential liability, which deters them from even experimenting with non-core policing. The implementation of non-core policing will remain tepid unless legislation reduces that liability while providing for a more coherent and systematic set of standards.

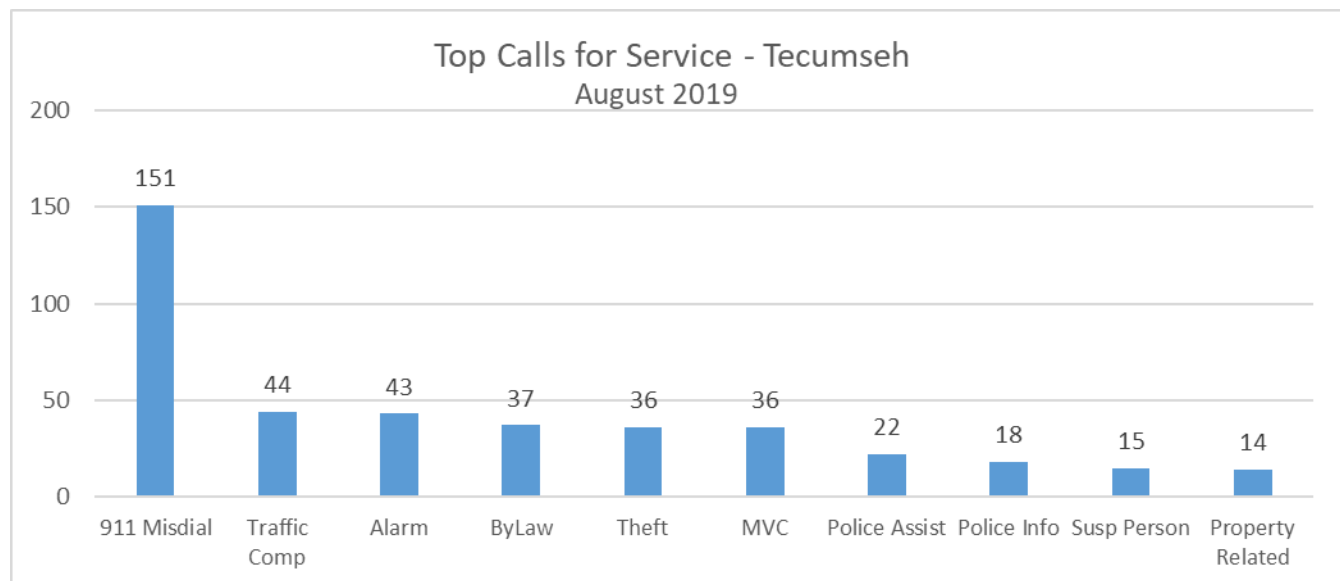

Now Therefore Be It Resolved That the Municipal, Federal and Provincial governments and relevant associations, including but not limited to, the Ontario Association of Police Services Boards (OAPSB), the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP), the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), be requested to lobby the telecommunications industry and smart phone manufacturers to develop a solution to 911 Misdials.

Background

The Tecumseh Police Services Board (Board) receives regular reports from the Essex County OPP (OPP) on statistics related to calls for service. Over the past months, the Board has expressed concern on a number of occasions regarding the trend of increasing calls for service related to 911 Misdials, and the high proportion of total calls these represent.

At their October 10, 2019 meeting, the Board reviewed data contained in the 'Police Services Board Monthly Overview August 2019' produced by the OPP. The chart below shows the OPP's top calls for service in Tecumseh for the month of August 2019:



The report includes comparative information with other Essex County OPP Detachment municipalities and notes the following trends in the detachment area:

- A 65.7% increase in 911 Misdials in August 2019 (898 calls) compared to August 2018 (542 calls)
- An average of 29.9 Misdial calls per day
- 911 Misdials are trending 63.2% higher YTD 2019 (5,867 calls) compared to YTD 2018 (3,596)

Concern about escalating 911 Misdials and the effect of this trend on policing and police budgets was also raised at the recent Joint Essex County Police Services Board meeting held in Leamington on August 29, 2019. This meeting was attended by the boards from all Essex County OPP-policed municipalities, namely the Towns of Essex, Kingsville, Lakeshore, Tecumseh and Municipality of Leamington.

Following discussion of this data, and as a result of concerns expressed by members of the Board on multiple occasions, the Board passed Motion PSB 43/19 at the October 10, 2019 PSB meeting:

Whereas the calls for service for 911 Misdials have risen dramatically in recent years, correlated with the rise in cell phone use; and

Whereas 911 Misdials must be responded to as if they were legitimate emergency calls; and

Whereas each 911 call is responded to with two OPP officers at an average time per call of 1.2 hours; and

Whereas each 911 call is a billable call to the municipality; and

Whereas in 2019 alone to date, 911 Misdials in Tecumseh number 1,082 calls, which is 28.8% of all billable calls for service to date; and

Whereas 911 Misdials are not unique to Tecumseh and in fact are common across the Province at an estimated cost of millions of dollars;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved That the Tecumseh Police Services Board request Town Council to approach the Federal and Provincial governments and associations, including but not limited to, the Ontario Association of Police Services Boards (OAPSB), the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP), the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), to lobby the telecommunications industry to develop a solution to 911 Misdials.

Comments

Administration obtained the most recent data available for 911 Misdials from the OPP. As of October 12, 2019, the OPP have responded to 1,082 911-related billable calls in Tecumseh, broken down as follows. This represents 28.8% of all calls for service in 2019 YTD. (Note: the categories correspond to those used in the OPP billing statement.)

The table below compares the 2019 statistics to previous years. While some 'zero data' is included, the total figures are most relevant. The OPP notes that the Pocket Dial category was introduced in 2013 and the Dropped Cell category was introduced in 2014. As the years went on, officers have become more diligent in classifying 911 misdials into these subcategories as opposed to the more general 911 Hang Up category.

While some fluctuations are apparent, the estimated total number of misdials for 2019 is more than double the total recorded in 2013 and represents an 89% increase over 2018.

As noted earlier, the Board has expressed concerns about this trend both in relation to policing and the police budget. Each 911 call is handled the same way, with at least two officers dispatched to locate the source and respond. It can reasonably be concluded that time and resources spent responding to 911 Misdials divert resources from other community policing activities and initiatives. Efforts have been made by the Town and the OPP to educate the public on 911 misdials to curb frequency of such calls.

The Board's resolution recognizes that Tecumseh is not alone in dealing with this widespread issue. It also suggests that the solution does not necessarily lie in increased public education and awareness, but rather in the redesign of cell phone technology and the way it interfaces with the 911 system. New, easier-to-use features on smart phone releases are something the public takes comfort in, knowing that in an emergency they can reach 911 dispatch easily and send their coordinates to the dispatcher. However, the issue of 911 Misdials should also be raised with smart phone manufacturers to resolve inadvertent 911 calls, which appear to be on the rise.

Financial Implications

With respect to the police budget, the impact of one year's increase in call volume is not proportionately reflected in the billing statement, as the municipality's "Calls for Service" costs (a weighted portion of the provincial total) are calculated based on a four-year average. The escalating volume of calls will, however, contribute to a higher four-year average over time.

As described previously to Council during the budget process, Ontario municipalities are mandated through the current *Police Services Act* (1990) (Act) and the *Community Safety and Policing Act* (2019) to develop and adopt Community Safety and Well-Being (CSWB) Plans by January 1, 2021. The nature of CSWB planning is to proactively address locally identified priority risks arising from social conditions that contribute to crime, addiction, suicide and other negative outcomes. The plan identifies and prioritizes the risks and develops strategies to reduce and address the risks along with measurable outcomes.

The Act provides municipalities with discretion to develop a CSWB plan individually or jointly with other municipalities and also requires the establishment of a multi-sectoral advisory committee to guide the planning process. In discussion with the Tecumseh Police Services Board, there was concurrence with the proposal to undertake the planning process jointly with other area municipalities and the County.

As CSWB plans will involve social and public health agencies and many of these operate at the regional level, the area municipal Chief Administrative Officers (CAOs) share the desire to collaborate with the County and the City of Windsor on the development of a regional plan with appendices to address the specific needs of each municipality in the County.

Comments

Working in collaboration with the other area municipal CAOs, the County of Essex CAO and the CAO for the City of Windsor, a proposal was put forward for the County to co-lead the CSWB planning exercise with the City of Windsor. The City of Windsor had begun their planning process earlier in 2019 under the direction of a dedicated Project Manager. On the request of the County CAO, the City Administration approached Windsor City Council on November 18th to proceed with the CSWB planning process jointly with the County and area municipalities. Windsor City Council supported this request.

A report to County Council was brought forward by the County CAO at the regular meeting of November 20th requesting Council's favourable consideration to partner with the City of Windsor and the seven area municipalities on a joint CSWB plan for Windsor and Essex County. This request included a 50/50 cost share arrangement whereby the County would cover related expenses for CSWB plan development through a contribution of \$200,000 matching the City's budget for this item. County Council supported this request.

Financial Implications

As noted above, the financial commitment to the CSWB planning process for Tecumseh is coming from the County of Essex which is covering the cost in a 50/50 cost share arrangement with the City of Windsor, with a matching contribution of \$200,000. While this is anticipated to cover the Town's costs, there may be some ancillary and minor costs to Tecumseh for such things as advertising and hosting consultation meetings that can be covered through the Professional Services line item of the CAO budget.

Additionally, there will be a commitment of staff time to the CSWB primarily through the CAO's Office, Corporate Services, Fire & Rescue Services and the OPP. Other departments may be involved from time to time. Moreover, a commitment of time from the Tecumseh Police Services Board and members of Council is expected with more detail to come in forthcoming reports.

Purpose

To provide Council with information and a recommendation to partner with the City of Windsor and the seven local municipalities in the development and adoption of a regional Community Safety and Well-Being (CSWB) Plan for Windsor-Essex County.

Background

Effective January 1, 2019, the *Police Services Act (1990)* mandates Ontario municipalities to develop and adopt a CSWB Plan, working in collaboration with policing and community partners to proactively address locally identified priority risks, such as systemic discrimination and other social factors that contribute to crime, victimization, addiction, drug overdose and suicide, and any other prescribed risk factors; strategies to reduce the prioritized risk factors, and setting measurable outcomes following implemented strategies.

The legislation provides municipalities with the discretion to develop a CSWB Plan individually or jointly with other municipalities.

At the most recent regional Chief Administrative Officers meeting, discussion regarding CSWB Plan process and the interrelated nature of the regional community agencies that would be engaged in each municipal CSWB Plan within Windsor-Essex County led to the concept and proposal of the

development of a regional plan. It is important to highlight that although the CSWB Plan would be regional in nature and take advantage of economic synergies, specific recommendations for each municipality would be identified based on their own prioritized risk factors.

Discussion

CSWB Plans are to be completed by municipalities no later than January 1, 2021. The Police Services Act requires the establishment of a multi-sectoral advisory committee(s), comprised of a number of cross-sectoral partners, which for Windsor-Essex County are common to the region, including, at a minimum, representation from:

- Police services
- The Local Health Integration Network (LHIN)
- Local service providers in health/mental health care
- Education
- Community/social services
- Children/youth services
- Municipal representation, employee or member of council
- Other members, as appropriate

The Province's intent is to proactively ensure efficiency, effectiveness and sustainability by dedicated time and resources up front through enhancements in social development, prevention and risk intervention strategies to reduce instances that require an incident response.

Windsor Administration and City Council (Subject to approval at their November 18th Council meeting) are in agreement to lead this project, through a dedicated Project Manager, Mr. Leonardo Gil, with oversight by co-lead of the Commissioner of Community Development and Health Services and the Chief of Windsor Police. It is envisioned that consultant services will be acquired to assist with community engagement within each municipality and the development of appendices for each municipality that would identifying prioritized risk, strategies to minimize these risks and measurable outcomes.

Financial Implications

At this stage, total cost of development of the regional CSWB Plan, inclusive of prioritized risks (appendices) for each municipality is unknown. The proposal, as outlined by the City (Appendix I) establishes a budget based on

a 50/50 cost share arrangement, where the County would help cover staff resources, consulting and related expenditures leading to the completed report and perhaps some preliminary follow up in 2021 related to measurable outcomes. A commitment of \$200,000 from both the City and County is proposed at this time for this project. Given the project nature and primarily one-time costs, it is Administration's recommendation that these funds would be drawn from the Corporation's Rate Stabilization Reserve and not impact the County Levy.

Recommendation

That County Council support the development of a regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan, led by the City of Windsor and include involvement and representation from each of the seven local municipalities

AND

That the County fund the regional plan 50/50 with the City of Windsor, through a contribution of \$200,000 from the Corporation's Rate Stabilization Reserve.

THAT City Council **AUTHORIZE** the Commissioner of Community Development and Health Services to engage the County of Essex and its municipalities to develop a regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan; and,

THAT subject to approval by City and County Councils, a matching contribution of \$200,000 from the County of Essex **BE ALLOCATED** to the City of Windsor for the development of the regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan; and,

THAT the Community Development and Health Commissioner or her designate **BE AUTHORIZED** to take such actions as required to implement, operationalize and manage the project, including signing and executing the necessary agreements and documents related to the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan, provided such agreements and documents comply with the governing program requirements, the City's Purchasing By-law and are in a form and content satisfactory to the City Solicitor, satisfactory in the financial content to the City Treasurer and satisfactory in technical content to the Manager of Social Policy and Planning and such that expenditures do not exceed the approved budget for the program; and further,

THAT Administration **BE DIRECTED** to bring the regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan to City Council and Essex County Council in sufficient time to be considered prior to the Provincial government's deadline of January 1, 2021.

Executive Summary:

N/A

Background:

The previous provincial government initiated the development of a provincial response to crime and victimization through a collaborative and integrated crime prevention approach. The current government has made new legislative amendments to the Police Services Act which, effective January 1, 2019, mandate every municipality to prepare and adopt a Community Safety and Well-Being Plan. Municipalities are required to work in conjunction with police services and other community organizations as applicable. Plans must be prepared and adopted by January 1, 2021.

At their meeting of July 8, 2019, City Council approved Report S97/2019, authorizing the Commissioner of Community Development and Health Services and the now Chief of Windsor Police Services to co-lead the development of the Plan. Additionally, the Commissioner was authorized to hire a Project Manager to ensure the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan would be developed within prescribed timelines. We are pleased to report that the successful candidate was Mr. Leonardo Gil.

At their last meeting, the regional Chief Administrative Officers discussed the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan process and proposed including the County, its municipalities and respective Police service, to develop a regional Plan with specific recommendations for each municipality, and ensure efficient and coordinated services.

Discussion:

Community Development and Health Services (CDHS) is the Consolidated Municipal Service Manager and service delivery agent on behalf of the Province in both the City and the County for Ontario Works, Housing, and Children's Services/EarlyON sites. Furthermore, CDHS has been either the lead or an active participant in numerous regional planning bodies that address social and health related issues in Windsor and Essex County. These include the Windsor-Essex Community Opioid and Substance Strategy (WECOSS), the Windsor Essex Situation Table, Ontario Health Teams (OHT), Windsor Essex By-Names Prioritized List (BNPL), Windsor-Essex Local Immigration Partnership (WE LIP), ProsperUS, and the Oral Health Education and Awareness Advisory Committee.

The system leaders and community partners who have comprised these tables represent an array of sectors from across the region. CDHS's connection with regional planning bodies also extends to its role as a key player in emergency preparedness for the City of Windsor, County of Essex and all municipalities within Essex County. This experience aligns well with the public safety participants who will be asked to contribute to creating a regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan.

The report brought to Council last summer also noted that efforts to develop Windsor's plan would be complementary, and linked where appropriate, to existing community development initiatives such as Pathway to Potential, the Windsor-Essex Community

Opioid Strategy, Crime Prevention through Environmental Design work, ProsperUS and other neighbourhood group projects.

While each individual municipality may identify its own priority risks, it is anticipated that the work to improve safety and well-being will be transferrable across the region. A coordinated approach, while identifying risks specific to each municipality, will ensure a fulsome Plan to address the obligations as outlined in legislation.

Administration is seeking City Council's approval to approach the development of the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan from a regional perspective.

Risk Analysis:

There is a low risk to the City of Windsor should a regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan not be adopted as prescribed. There is risk to each of the County municipalities as they are obligated to deliver CSWB Plans under the same legislation as the City. However, there is a reputational risk in that the City is the Consolidated Municipal Service Manager delivering services on behalf of the Province in both the City and the County. Community Development and Health Services enjoys a respectful and mutually beneficial relationship with partners and residents in both the City and the County.

Financial Matters:

The Police Services Act mandates every municipality to prepare and adopt a Community Safety and Well-Being Plan by January 1, 2021. In response to the need to develop a Plan for the City, on July 8, 2019 City Council approved that any costs for the development of the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan and Project Manager be charged to the Budget Stabilization Reserve to an upset limit of \$200,000. (CR340/2019)

As noted above, a regional planning process was discussed by the regional Chief Administrative Officers. Should City Council authorize the development of a regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan, a request will be brought to County Council to match the City's \$200,000 contribution to cover the additional expenses necessary to ensure the Plan addresses the City and all County municipalities.

The cost of developing a regional Community Safety and Well-Being Plan will be shared equally between the City and the County. Although the population of the City is slightly higher than the County, there are seven County municipalities that will each require identification of their own priority risks.

Upon completion of the CSWB plan, and pending further direction from the Province, the City and County will jointly determine next steps and future funding beyond January 2021. Should a need for on-going funding be identified, a request for annualized funding will be brought forward to City and County Councils during the 2021 budget development process.

Conclusion:

The County of Essex has requested that the City of Windsor consider leading the creation of a regional Community Safety and Well Being Plan in lieu of a stand-alone City of Windsor plan. Should City Council approve a regional approach, The County of Essex will be approached to approve this proposal and to co-fund the development of the regional plan, resulting in no additional costs to the City of Windsor. Upon completion of the regional Community Safety and Well Being Plan, the City and County will jointly determine next steps and future funding beyond January 2021.
