#### 2. OPP Report to Tecumseh PSB - January - March 2022

Staff Sgt. Jamie Smith provided an overview of the OPP Report for the months of January to March 2022. He indicated that he will follow up on the accuracy of the traffic enforcement data, as there could be issues with the new e-ticket system.

Mayor McNamara noted the 24% drop in POA charges for March compared to last year. He indicated that the recent home invasion in Tecumseh was of particular concern and asked if it was random or targeted? Sgt. Smith indicated this incident was targeted.

Member Marc Gomes asked about the increase in false alarms (41% increase over same period in 2021). Staff Sgt. Smith reported that many of the incidents are in the industrial areas, and some could be triggered by wind events. Chair Hales requested that Sgt. Smith report back to the board with more details to explain the increase. Mayor McNamara suggested that an educational/social media campaign may be needed as each incident generates a call for service and has to be investigated, thereby using police resources.

#### K. Old Business

#### 1. Community Safety and Policing Grant 2022-23 - 2024-25

Re: Essex County OPP Update

Staff Sgt. Smith reported that the recent application for a three-year Community Safety and Policing Grant in support of the Mobile Crisis Rapid Response Team (MCRRT), Mental Health Response Unit (MHRU) and Youth Crisis Rapid Response (YCRT) was successful for the full amount requested. CAO Margaret Misek-Evans indicated that the Town is completing the necessary paperwork and that the Town of Kingsville will once again be administering the grant funding on behalf of the participating Essex County boards.

### 2. LAS Automated Speed Enforcement

#### Re: CAO Update

CAO Margaret Misek-Evans reported that Town Administration is investigating this technology as a potential tool. LAS currently has one municipal pilot project underway, with plans to support additional projects (likely in the fall). The program will offer six month, one year and two year contracts, with a range of camera and ticketing processing costs. The CAO noted that any revenue garnered from tickets would go through the POA court system, which is very backed up at this time. Administration has raised the possibility of an automated municipal payment system as an alternative for collection of fines, but this is still in deliberation. LAS is preparing a FAQ document and the CAO will share it with the board when available. She noted that Tecumseh is the only municipality that has expressed an interest in this grant program in Essex County. Sharing the program with a neighboring municipality would help reduce administrative costs for ticket processing.

Chair Hales inquired if signage at the Town's boundaries would be required if participating in the program. CAO Misek-Evans confirmed that there must be notification to residents, and the speed enforcement can only take place in school zones or community safety zones.

### 1. Other New Business

Re: Community Safety Officer

Deputy Mayor Bachetti inquired about the status of Community Safety Officers in the county. He explained that, in his role as a school principal, he has received requests from parents for a CSO to speak to students. Staff Sgt. Smith responded that when the COVID-19 pandemic hit, CSOs were redirected to other duties. Currently, one officer has been designated for attendance at public events, but not specifically for school programs. The request for the latter must originate with the school boards, which are currently reviewing their approach to having CSOs in the schools. Staff Sgt. Smith will provide Deputy Mayor Bachetti with the contact information of the current CSO who may be able to assist in certain cases.

### Traffic:



- Identify co-response solutions for non-police-related demands for service










### Top Calls for Service<sup>2</sup>






Calls for Service<sup>3</sup>



Property Crime<sup>5</sup>













| Lakeshore  | A 37 yr. old male has been charged with Theft of a MV, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime,<br>Operation While Prohibited, Dangerous Operations, Theft from MV x2 and Fail to Comply with Release<br>Order x3 after police responded to a collision involving a black pickup truck which failed to remain at the<br>scene. A short time later, that same vehicle was involved in another collision with a parked car.<br>Witnesses observed the driver flee on foot and provided his description. Officers patrolled the area<br>extensively and located a male matching the description, sitting on a bench outside a business in the<br>area of Amy Croft. Officers spoke to that male and formed grounds to believe he was the involved driver.<br>A search incident to arrest located property linking this male to other thefts in the area.  |

| Kingsville | Officers were dispatched to a reported abduction taking place in Learnington. The complainant had received panicked text messages from her sister telling her to call 911 and feared the sister was going to be trafficked. While officers patrolled for the suspect vehicle, the female was able to escape the situation and attend the Kingsville detachment. There the female explained she was initially in the male's company at her request but changed her mind when his behaviour became erratic. Several time she had asked to exit the vehicle but was denied. The male became aware of police involvement after a friend heard dispatch information over a police scanner and attempted to switch vehicles to a taxicab. While making the vehicle change, a witness nearby seemed alerted to the situation which allowed the female to leave freely. Based upon the investigation, the 45 yr. old male was charged with Theft, Operation while Prohibited x2 and Forcible Confinement. |
| Tecumseh   | A Caller reported interrupting a Break & Enter in progress at his farm property. A family member, in the vicinity, was able to locate the suspect truck and trailer and provided police with updates. Windsor Police were alerted of the vehicle travel towards the city and patrolled the area. Windsor Police responded to the area and set up containment of a field area once the vehicle driver fled on foot. The 33 yr. old male was arrested and turned over to OPP officers where he was charged with Break & Enter, Possess Property Obtained by Crime and Mischief.   |
| Essex      | Multiple officers, including patrol, ERT, K9, TRU and Crisis Negotiators responded to a domestic occurrence in which a male barricaded himself inside his residence with a long gun after a heated dispute with his common law. The spouse and dog were able to safety leave the residence, while the male maintained his position. Several hours into the standoff, members of TRU made contact with the 32 yr. old male who attended the front entry of the residence and was taken into custody. The male was charged with Utter Threats and Possession of a Weapon for a Dangerous Purpose. Further investigation revealed an earlier domestic incident between the two, resulting in the male being additionally charged with Assault and Assault Cause Bodily Harm.   |
| Provincial | A vehicle was stopped on Highway 401 just outside Essex County for speeding. The officer observed the driver to have cannabis readily accessible and conducted a vehicle search which resulted in the officer locating a 9mm magazine. The 42 yr. old driver from Hamilton was Prohibited from possessing weapons and ammunition and was arrested. A search of the vehicle with the help of K9 Maximus located a loaded handgun, 2 more loaded pistol magazines, cocaine and purple fentanyl. In addition to speeding, the male was charged with multiple weapons and drug offences and held for Show Cause.  |

The Ministry of the Solicitor General (the ministry) has received several queries regarding the responsibilities of police services board members running in the upcoming provincial or municipal elections in 2022.

All members of a police services board should review Ontario Regulation 421/97 *Members of Police Services Boards* – Code of Conduct.

Normal

**PRIORITY:** 

The ministry advises that a board member should disclose to the police services board their decision to be a candidate in the provincial or municipal elections as soon as possible. Board members appointed by Lieutenant Governor in Council (LGIC), are advised to also inform their respective ministry Police Services Advisor as soon as possible.

Board members who are candidates in the June 2022 provincial election may wish to consider taking a leave of absence during the writ period if they feel that, at any point they would be, or had the potential to be, in a real or perceived conflict of interest.

A police services board may have its own rules and procedures related to the political activity of its board members that should be reviewed, including those developed in accordance with s.37 of the *Police Services Act*. All board members appointed by LGIC intending to engage in political activity should also consider contacting their respective Ethics Executive/Integrity Commissioner as may be applicable.

Should a board member appointed by LGIC be elected, the board member should consider notifying the ministry and the police services board immediately, to determine next steps.

As you may be aware, on December 2, 2021, the *Employment Standards Act, 2000* (the *Act*), was amended to create a new requirement for a "right to disconnect" policy.

The *Act* was amended to create a new Part VII.0.1, which establishes a requirement for employers with 25 or more employees as of January 1 of the given year to have a written policy about employees disconnecting from work. "*Disconnecting from work*" is defined under <u>section 21.1.1</u> of the *Act* to mean not engaging in work-related communications, including emails, telephone calls, video calls or the sending or reviewing of other messages, so as to be free from the performance of work.

This requirement applies to all employers covered by the *Act* in relation to their employees who are subject to the *Act*, except the Crown, a Crown agency or an authority, board, commission or corporation whose members are all appointed by the Crown and their employees. It should be noted that the *Act* does not apply to a police officer or a person for whom a police officer performs work, except as provided in Part XVI (Lie Detectors).

As a result, this requirement applies to all municipal police services boards with at least 25 employees who are not police officers (e.g., civilian members of the police service, special constables, board support staff). For First Nation police services, the application of this requirement (and the *Act* generally) depends on whether the employment relationship falls within provincial jurisdiction – the *Act* does not apply to employment

relationships that fall under federal jurisdiction. This requirement does not apply to the Ontario Provincial Police, as part of the Crown.

The written policy will need to be in place before March 1 of each year and must contain the date it was made, as well as the date any changes were made to it. However, employers have a grace period for 2022 and will not need to have a written policy in place until June 2, 2022.

Employers will be required to provide a copy of the written policy to each employee within 30 days of preparing the policy or, if an existing written policy is changed, within 30 days of the changes being made.

You may wish to refer to <u>Your guide to the *Employment Standards Act*</u> for further information regarding the written policy on disconnecting from work.

The Chief Medical Officer of Health (CMOH) has issued a Class Order made pursuant to Section 22 under Section 77.1 of the *Health Protection and Promotion Act* (HPPA). This Class Order is to continue the requirement for masking in certain settings.

## The Order took effect at 12:00 a.m. April 27, 2022 and is expected to remain in place until 12:00 a.m. (the first instant of) June 11, 2022, unless otherwise extended or revoked.

All police officers and provincial offences officers are authorized to enforce the CMOH's order. Failure to comply with the order is an offence under subsection 100(1) of the HPPA.

- Non-compliance with the CMOH's order is a ticketable offence under the *Provincial Offences Act* (POA), subject to a set \$750.00 fine.
- Non-compliance with the CMOH's order is an offence for which one is liable, on conviction, to a fine of not more than \$5,000.00 for every day or part of each day on which the offence occurs or continues. For corporations, they may be liable, on conviction, to a fine of not more than \$25,000 for every day or part of each day on which the offence occurs or continues.

The CMOH Class Order replicates the current masking requirements under O. Reg. 364/20 under *the Reopening* Ontario (A Flexible Response to COVID-19) Act, 2020 (ROA) which expires on April 27, 2022. It does not impose any additional requirements.

Limited settings where masking requirements will continue include:

- Public transit including indoor areas and vehicles, but excluding businesses or organizations that provide sightseeing or touring services
- Hospitals, including private hospitals, and psychiatric facilities
- Other health care settings:
  - Clinics that provide health care services (doctors' offices, Community Health Centres, public health/immunization clinics, mental health clinics, etc.)
  - o Laboratories and specimen collection centres
  - Independent Health Facilities (e.g., dialysis, birth centres, nuclear medicine)
  - Employees and contractors of home and community care providers
- Long-term care homes
- Retirement homes
- Congregate care settings that provide care and services to medically and socially vulnerable individuals
- Shelters

For a detailed list of settings where wearing a mask will continue to apply as well as a list of exemptions, please refer to the attachments. An example of an exempted setting includes correctional institutions or in a custody and detention program for young persons in conflict with the law. A copy of the Order can also be found <u>here</u>.

The order applies to the persons responsible for the business or organization that is listed. It also applies to persons in the indoor areas of the premises of a listed business or organization or in a vehicle operating as part of the business or organization.

Please note that on April 6, 2022, O. Reg 8/21 under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protections Act* was revoked. As such, the ability of police officers and other provincial offences officers to compel individuals to identify themselves in order to lay a charge for contravening a Section 22 COVID-19 order is no longer available.

#### RE: Continued Mask and Face Covering Requirements in Certain Settings beyond April 27, 2022

I am writing to advise you I have issued a Class Order (herein referred to as "Order") made pursuant to Section 22 under Section 77.1 of *the Health Protection and Promotion Act* (HPPA) to continue the requirement for masking in certain settings as of 12:00 a.m. (the first instant of) on April 27, 2022. These limited settings include indoor areas of:

- Public transit including indoor areas and vehicles, but excluding businesses or organizations that provide sightseeing or touring services
- Hospitals, including private hospitals, and psychiatric facilities
- Other health care settings:
  - Clinics that provide health care services (doctors' offices, other medical offices, Community Health Centres, public health/immunization clinics, mental health clinics, etc.)
  - o Laboratories and specimen collection centres
  - o Independent Health Facilities (e.g., dialysis, birth centres, nuclear medicine)
  - Employees and contractors of home and community care providers
- Long-term care homes

- Retirement homes
- Congregate care settings that provide care and services to medically and socially vulnerable individuals
- Shelters

For a detailed list of settings where wearing a mask will continue to apply, please see refer to the attached Order or visit <u>here</u>.

Please note this Order does not impose any additional requirements to those in currently in place under O. Reg. 364/20 of the *Reopening Ontario (A Flexible Response to COVID-19) Act* which will expire on April 27, 2022.

Maintaining mask and face covering requirements will provide additional protection in these specific settings and environments where individuals who are, or may be, at increased risk of severe outcomes are in close contact for extended periods of time, such as congregate living settings and on public transportation.

I encourage you to post a copy of this Order at all entrances/exits in all premises in your business or organization, in a conspicuous location visible to the public, that informs individuals on this requirement prior to entering.

It is intended this Order will remain in place until 12:00 a.m. (the first instant of) on June 11, 2022 unless otherwise extended or revoked. I will continue to monitor and assess key indicators and the COVID-19 situation across the province to assess the need for this and any other public health measures.

While the COVID-19 pandemic is not over, we have come to a place where we know what we need to do to manage this virus and to keep each other safe.

I would like to take an opportunity to acknowledge the collective efforts of our enforcement partners, who have worked relentlessly to serve and protect Ontarians over the course of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Further to All Chiefs Memorandum 20-0031, 20-0047, 21-0005 and 22-0032, I am writing to advise that effective immediately, the Ministry of the Solicitor General (ministry) has discontinued the COVID-19 Enforcement Support Line. In addition, the ministry will also be winding down province-wide reporting on enforcement of the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* (EMCPA) and the *Reopening Ontario* (A Flexible Response to COVID-19) Act, 2020 (ROA), in response to COVID-19.

The Ontario government, in consultation with the Chief Medical Officer of Health, has been cautiously and gradually easing public health and workplace safety measures. However, masking and face covering requirements will remain in place in certain settings under a Class Order made by the Chief Medical Officer of Health pursuant to section 22 under Section 77.1 of the Health Protection and Promotion Act until June 11, 2022, unless extended or revoked. The ministry's plan to discontinue the COVID-19 Enforcement Support Line and the collection of related enforcement data is aligned with the expiry of relevant orders under the EMCPA and ROA.

#### **Action Required:**

The ministry requests that police services boards and Chiefs submit outstanding enforcement data to <u>solgen.reporting@ontario.ca</u> by May 16, 2022, to ensure the collection of up-to-date information. This would include:

- Any historical enforcement data that has not yet been submitted to the ministry; and
- Sustained weekly submission of enforcement data up to April 27, 2022.

Services are asked to remind their personnel of any requirements for records retention related to their EMCPA and/or ROA compliance and enforcement activities.

### Submission of COVID-19 related enforcement data beyond the dates indicated above will no longer be required.

#### **Enforcement Activities Reported to the Ministry**

Over the course of the pandemic from March 2020 to April 23, 2022:

- There were nearly 340,000 enforcement activities reported to the Ministry of the Solicitor General by police agencies, municipalities, public health units and regulatory ministries.
- Of the total activities reported, nearly 290,000 pertained to individuals or businesses that were educated about public health requirements by provincial offences officers.
- Over 35,000 warnings were issued, over 12,000 charges under Part I of the *Provincial Offences Act* (POA), and about 1,300 charges under Part III of the POA were laid, and over 1,000 orders under O. Reg. 8/21 were issued (including orders to disperse, orders to provide information, and orders for temporary closures).
